CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP.

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago we were advised by a subscriber to insert a notice of a sale of land in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or table purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for the item in the event of the item not being chargeable; or more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if they are charged for, and to all such there is one reply—all items etc. of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable for but once in either Morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion as they are thus not news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.

CENSUS OFFICIAL SPOILED A SLOGAN

Facts of the Immense Frauds Whereby Cities Sought to Boom Themselves

ST. LOUIS, MO., Aug. 21.—Cleveland A. Newton, former assistant circuit attorney, now special assistant to the attorney-general of the United States in census fraud investigations, has arrived home from Tacoma, Wash., where he spoiled a slogan, says a writer in a local paper.

"Watch Tacoma Grow" was the slogan. Mr. Newton and other representatives of the federal government watched it awhile, then knocked 35,000 fraudulent names off the city's 1910 census returns, and now suggestions for a new slogan are in order.

Tacoma was the most fruitful field among the twelve northern and northwestern cities and towns where Mr. Newton has conducted his investigations with the aid of special grand juries. The change in its official population, from approximately 117,000 to 82,000, was the greatest made anywhere, and the 26 indictments there were almost one-half the total number which were voted by the grand juries as a result of the inquiry. The Tacoma inquiry is not over yet.

Superior, Wis., in its efforts to excel its commercial rival, Duluth, padded its returns 12,000, and six men were indicted. Seattle lost 12,000 by the revision of its rolls, and there were three indictments there. Portland, Ore., was much less affected in its returns, but had five indictments.

In smaller places indictments were found as follows: Walla Walla, Wash., one; Missoula, Mont., two; Harve, Mont., two; Billings, Mont., four; Bellingham, Wash., one; Hoquiam, Wash., one; Aberdeen, Wash., one.

"Some odd reasons were behind these violations of the census law," said Mr. Newton. "Have needed 5,000 population in order to get an Elk's lodge established there, and two census enumerators took it upon themselves to make up what the town lacked. They put down more employees of the Northern Pacific railroad in Havre than that railroad has in the entire state of Montana.

"Walla Walla needed 20,000 in or has in the entire state of Montana, applicable to cities of that size, and Superior wanted 40,000 for the same reason. Superior was also moved by rivalry with Duluth. In Spokane and Tacoma it was a case of inflated commercial rivalry, and Tacoma, really the smaller city of the two, managed to put itself ahead of Spokane in the first returns by what was perhaps as big a job of padding as was ever done in this country.

"The twelve places where grand juries are summoned are the only ones in the United States, with one exception where census frauds of any magnitude were found. This seems due to the thirst of the northwest for population. There was nothing of the sort in the east or the south, save for the isolated case of Fort Smith, Ark. There it was not necessary to call a special grand jury, as the case was dealt with before the rest were taken up. Three men were fined and one went to jail in Fort Smith.

"Most of the men indicted were enumerators. They were accused of making false claims against the

government in taking their pay for enrolling bogus names. The punishment for these offences is a \$2,000 fine or prison sentence running up to five years. Several offenders in Baltimore were fined and imprisoned for frauds in the 1900 census, so that the law has been tested and upheld. "A few indictments are for conspiracy, and the defendants are real estate men or boomers who, with various motives, are believed to have connived with the enumerators at the frauds. In one city the mayor and a leading lawyer were indicted but have not yet been arrested or the fact of the indictments made public. In Tacoma the inquiry as to

the men higher up is not completed. "In Tacoma, where the recall makes elections frequent, and politics seems always at fever heat, some candidates early this year printed on their cards, 'I helped take the census.' Such declarations are not now as common as they were before the special grand jury did its work. Public sentiment there has turned strongly against the census paddlers. "The wealthiest and most fashionable families of Tacoma were much offended when they found that each of them had been officially credited with keeping a number of boarders, whose occupations, as shown on the rolls, those of laborer, porter and bartender.

"Thousands of the inhabitants of Tacoma were made involuntary property owners by the census frauds. (Continued on page 6)
