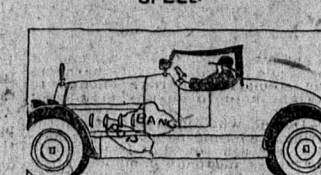

HINTS FOR The Motorist

ENGINE BACKFIRES AT HIGH SPEED



C. A. G. asks: What causes an engine to backfire and miss when it is running at a high rate of speed with wide open throttle? Is it defective carburation or ignition?

Answer: Backfiring into the carburetor is generally the result of a too lean mixture, the specific cause differing with the type of carburetor used. It may be the auxiliary air-valve sticks open or that its spring is too weakly adjusted. In a double jet carburetor the secondary jet may not come into action properly. In a carburetor with metering-pin for the gasoline this may not open at a rapid enough rate as throttle is opened.

Any carburetor with insufficient fuel feed from the tank or a partially obstructed spraying-nozzle may backfire at high speeds. Lack of heat around the manifold may also result in a too weak mixture. Missing at high speeds is likely to occur if the spark-plug gaps are too wide, if there are cracked porcelain or if the timer makes uncertain or too short contacts. Leaks in the secondary wiring may also cause it.

TREATMENT OF REVERSED BATTERY

B. M. M. writes: Recently I left my battery at a garage to be charged and they charged it in the wrong direction. I discharged it by turning on the car lights and then have it recharged in the right direction, will it be injured by the treatment which it has received?

Answer: If you attend to this battery at once we believe that it can be brought up all right. We should advise however, that instead of discharging through the lights you take it to a charging station and have them put it on charge, in the right direction at a very low rate—say four amperes for a battery of the usual size. At first the effect will be to discharge it, but after a



time it will begin to build up its normal charge. This low rate of charge may have to be kept up for nearly a week to bring up the gravity to normal and otherwise to put the battery in its original condition. We are assuming that it was in good condition when the mistake was made, but if this is not the fact and its condition was not good when the accident occurred there may be some doubt as to how completely recovery will take place.
