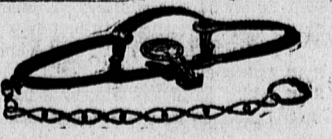

GERMAN SUBS ON WAY TO EUROPE

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The German submarines to be handed over to the Allies have passed through the Kaiser Wilhelm Canal on their way to England, according to advices received in Copenhagen from Kiel and transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph Company.

SURRENDER OF GERMAN NAVY BEGINS

LONDON, Nov. 21.—Twenty German submarines were surrendered to Rear Admiral Reginald W. Tyrwhitt, thirty miles off Harwich yesterday morning at sunrise, according to a press association despatch. They are the first U boats to be turned over to the Allies by Germany. Admiral Tyrwhitt received the surrender of the German craft on board his flagship, a British cruiser. The surrendered submarines will proceed to Harwich in charge of their own crews. The U boats will then be boarded by British crews and interpreters and proceed to Parkstone, Quay, near by. The Germans will leave the submarines there and board transports for their return to Germany. Twenty additional submarines will be surrendered on Thursday and twenty more on Friday. The remainder of the U boats to be handed over in accordance with the armistice terms will be given up later.

BOLSHEVIKI STILL FIGHTING

ARCHANGEL, Nov. 19.—Bolshevik forces have resumed their attacks against the American and British positions at Tulgal Tulga on the Dvina River. They have been repulsed with severe losses. On the morning of Nov. 11 after a heavy bombardment from their gunboats and barges in the river the Bolshevik stormed the barbed wire entanglements and succeeded temporarily in reaching the gun emplacements of the Canadian artillery.

GERMANY STILL SQUEALING

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Germany wants terms of the armistice modified so that she can have economic intercourse with the territory on the left bank of the Rhine as before the armistice. Dr. Solf, the foreign secretary, says in a wireless despatch received here. The message is addressed to governments of United States, Great Britain, France and Italy.

Letter From Nursing Sister Nicholson

The following are some extracts from a letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Nicholson, Charlottetown, from their daughter, Nursing Sister Elsie Nicholson, who has been at the front a long time:—

No. 6 Canadian C. C. S., B. E. F., France, October 27th.

I have been having the most interesting experiences. After the great German retreat, our C. C. S. was moved away up the line and are now occupying a German Hospital. The Germans moved out on a Thursday and we were here on Monday. Before the war, it was a large Trappist Monastery, and lends itself very well for a hospital. The grounds and gardens are lovely. Before the Huns left they cut off all heating, water and lighting, but we are gradually getting things straightened out. The Germans occupied the country since 1914 and the inhabitants are very delighted to have the British with them. When we go out for a walk, they rush out, bow and smile, shake hands and shout "Vive l'Angleterre." Some of the old men stop in the street and make us quite lengthy speeches of welcome. It is really pathetic to see them. They have suffered a lot in the last four years but they really look well fed. The price of everything is exorbitant and there is nothing of value in the shops. The Huns took everything of value before they left.

I had a letter the other day from—The casualties were very heavy for the Canadians in their last battle, but I have not noticed many P. E. Islanders in the list.

You have probably read a lot about Lille in the papers lately. Well we are very near there. We walked over there yesterday. It is a beautiful city—walled with ramparts.

I had a letter from one of our V. A. D's, and she seems to be enjoying the work. She says she has a lot of American patients.

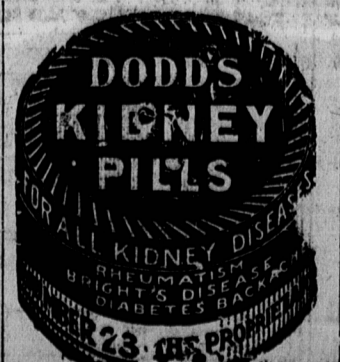
