Penalties Prove Costly To Leafs As Stanley Cup Champions Rally To Win

TORONTO, Nov. 6 (CP)—High scores of the National Hockey League last season, when they won the Stanley Cup, Toronto Maple Leafs have been held to only two goals in their first two 1938-39 starts and have been whipped both times. Chicago Black Hawks shut out the potentially powerful young Leafs 2-0 before 10,000 fans last night, beating Turk Broda twice in the last minute after goalie Milt Karakas and a rock-ribbed defence had thrown back an almost-continuous Toronto attack for 59 minutes. The result left the Hawks at the top of the standing and the Leafs on the bottom. The Chicagoans checked tenaciously until Murph Chamberlain drew a tripping penalty with just more than two minutes to play. A five-man power drive brought a goal through Mush March. Then, with hamberlain back and the Leafs ganging the Chicago goal, Russ Blinco broke away with Earl Selbert who went in from the left side to find a corner in the upper rigging behind Broda. On previous penalties, the visitors had been content with half-hearted four-man offensives. The wingman clung to their checks and Earl Selbert was king-pin of a defence that refused to let the attackers get near clean-cut shots at Karakas' net. In the second period Bob Davidson of the Leafs and Selbert were given major penalties for a brief fist-swinging bee.

Jack Shill, Hawk wingman, crashed into a goal-post in the second period and suffered strained back muscles. He is expected to return to the team next Sunday.

Desllets Sparks Chihawks To Third Straight Victory Defeating Canadiens 3-2

MONTREAL, Nov. 6 (CP)—The world champion Chicago Black Hawks made it three victories in a row tonight when they opened Montreal's new National Hockey League season before 11,000 fans with a 3-2 victory over Canadiens on a goal scored in the next to last minute of play by Joffre Desllets. Desllets, a former Saint John and Charlottetown player, traded by Canadiens earlier this season to Hawks for Louis Trudel, scored twice against his former teammates. While Earl Robinson, purchased from the disbanded Montreal Maroons, scored the other Chicago tally, Paul Haynes and Toe Blake counted the Canadiens goals. Blades Named Manager of St. Louis Team

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 6 (AP)—Ray Blades, a veteran of St. Louis Cardinal farm system, today was named manager of St. Louis National Baseball League club for 1939. It is the first time a Cardinal chain product has been named manager of the St. Louis team. The announcement of Blades' selection to replace Frankie Frisch, the tall end of whose five-year reign was filled in by coach Mike Gonzales late last season, was made by president Sam Breadon, who declared: "After carefully considering many candidates for the position I believe I could find no one better than Ray Blades." Blades has been at the helm of the Cardinals' Rochester club of the International League since 1935. Prior to that, in 1933, he led Columbus to its first American Association flag in 26 years. With Blades at Columbus in 1933 when he entered the managerial spotlight his first year was Mike Gonzalez who will remain with the Cards as coach under Blades next year. Terms of Blades' contract were not disclosed by Breadon. St. Louis Browns now are the only big league team without a manager for 1939.

Beef Loaf

Two pounds minced round steak, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1-2 cup scalded milk, 2 eggs, 1 small onion chopped finely, salt and pepper, 1-2 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 1 tablespoon minced parsley or celery leaves. Combine the crumbs, milk and the seasonings and heat to boiling point. Add the meat, onion and eggs, well beaten and mould into a loaf. Place in a baking pan, spread with butter, sprinkle with flour and bake in a hot oven for about fifteen minutes. Now add a little water to the pan and spread a layer of tomato sauce or catsup over the loaf. Bake for an hour, basting occasionally. You may bake potatoes in the same pan with the meat if you desire.

Do YOU keep your eyes open for odd and curious things which might be material for an "unusual picture" section in your snapshot album? Watch for such subjects when you are on a picture-taking jaunt, and you may be surprised at the things you find. Oddly twisted trees that look like old men—a freakish bit of architecture—a wall-shadow that looks like a human face in profile—an unusually realistic scarecrow in a farmer's field—novel cloud forms—all these are candidates for the "unusual picture" collection. Observe reflections, too. Picture the upside-down reflection of a building in water. Turn the picture right side up, and the water ripples look like heat waves. Extreme angle shots of some subjects, taken with camera pointed straight up or straight down, often produce weird effects. For example, put the camera on the floor at the bottom of a well-lighted circular staircase and take a "straight-up" shot—with short time exposure if you have a slow camera, or a snapshot if your camera has a fast lens. The resulting picture will be fantastic—but a good subject for your album. Shadows often produce picture oddities. Shadows of bars at the zoo may put a striped coat on a lion. Curved surfaces, such as a chromolium bowl or convex mirror, produce oddly distorted reflections you can't picture. And here's an idea: put a small subject such as a kitten or puppy on a glass-topped lawn table, and snap a picture from underneath. If you take care that the glass picks up no reflections, it will be invisible—and the subject will seem to be floating in air! These pictures are fun—both to take and to show to your friends. A good collection of "guess what?" or "guess how?" pictures can provide hours of entertainment at a party. Build up a clever album of such snapshots; it's not hard, and you'll have pictures worth while. John van Guilder.
