### FASHION HINTS



CHILD'S DOUBLE-BREADED PLEATED COAT, WITH SAILOR COLLAR OR NECK FACING.

(NO. 3152) Such a coat as this would be stylish made of broadcloth or taffeta, serge or cravenette. Pongee would also be suitable, and so would plique or linen.

The design as pictured was made of dark blue taffeta, with stitching in self color and a detachable collar and cuffs of Irish crochet.

Fullness is given to the bodice by one box plait at each side of the front and two in the back. These box plaits are stitched to waist depth.

The fronts are double-breasted and may be closed with buttons and button holes, or with buttons and loops. The neck may be finished with the neck facing, which is out on to simulate a flat collar, or the large sailor collar may be used.

The sleeves are the new-style bishop, quite full at the wrist, where the wrist band is finished by a turn-back cuff.

The pattern (3152) is cut in sizes for 2, 4, 6 and 8 years, and requires 2 1/2 yards of 36-inch material for the 4-year size, with 1/2 yard of contrasting material for collar and cuff.
