

# HAKKI PASHA VISITS KING

### Formerly Turkish Grand Vizier--Presented By Grey.

LONDON, March 12 (Special)—King George has received Hakki Pasha, at one time Turkish Grand Vizier, Sir Edward Grey, the British Foreign Secretary, presented him.

The reply of the allies to the Powers' offer of mediation in the war in Southeastern Europe is still awaited. It is asserted in diplomatic quarters that the allies in no case will consent to anything in the nature of submitting any questions to arbitration even if they should be willing to accept European mediation. According to a report in Sofia, the reply of the allies will be handed to the Powers Monday and will enumerate their peace terms, including a demand for an indemnity.

No news whatever was received from the theatre of war today. It is stated that the Greeks captured 188 guns around Janina, including thirty-five siege pieces.

## RUBBER STRIKERS FIGHT THE POLICE

### Bricks Thrown and Many Injured—Police Use Clubs.

AKRON, Ohio, March 12 (Special)—Striking rubber workers clashed with the police at the Goodrich Rubber Company plant at noon today. Bricks were thrown by the strikers and their sympathizers, and the police used their clubs with telling effect on the strikers. Two of the strikers were clubbed into unconsciousness and were rushed to a hospital.

Leaders of the Industrial Workers of the World says the "I. W. W. reserves" are here, and that they will use the same tactics as those recently employed at Lawrence, Mass., and elsewhere.

Sheriff David R. Ferguson, who was leading a force of deputies against the strikers, received a broken nose when a brick was hurled by one of the attacking party.
