THE VISITING SHIPS.

His Majesty's ships have been always very welcome to the port of Charlottetown and the feeling of regard has been increased during the brief stay in our harbor of the cruisers Cornwall and Berwick and by the opportunity for social intercourse on board and ashore. Within the memory of the oldest living persons British rule in Canada has been of the most beneficent character, and our people are loyally proud to belong to an Empire vaster than any that has been. The presence of His Majesty's ships serves to remind us of our good and wise King, who has added to his exalted titles that higher appellation of Peace maker. And we see in the vast and powerful British navy itself an instrument of peace. Were it otherwise it would long ago have been engaged in battle. As it is a British navy, more powerful than the floating armaments of any two of the great maritime nations, has in the memory of living men scarcely fired a hostile shot.

Not as the instrument of despotism, or for aggression or conquest the British navy exists. Not to stir up strife, or to provoke hostilities have its mighty battleships, cruisers and torpedo craft pursued their ceaseless movements over the seven seas. The King's ships in every sea are the guardians of liberty and peace. Never in all the world's history was such tremendous power so wisely and beneficently guided and controlled. This constitutes no small share of our pride in the British navy. And yet we feel assured that should the stern necessity arise the fleets of Britain and every officer and man upon their decks stand ready to do instant and sturdy battle for our defence as in the days of Nelson. Very glorious are the traditions of the British navy. It has fought heroically for liberty and order in the past, and it stands today a mighty bulwark to guard the peace of the world. "We are all delighted with Canada," said an officer of H. M. S. Berwick to the Guardian last evening. He added, "Your Island is a very pretty spot." It is gratifying to know that our visitors are apparently carrying away with them pleasant impressions of their brief stay in our port.

Sir Charles Tupper who with Lady Tupper returned to Canada a few days ago, thinks Mr. Chamberlain's policy is making good progress in public favor. He admits that the Liberal party will probably be returned to power at the coming general election in Great Britain, but thinks their term of office will be short.

Premier Tweedie of New Brunswick a few days ago expressed his opinion that no more third class teachers should be licensed. It certainly would be in the interest of education if more teachers of the second and first classes were employed in districts which are content with those of the third-class, mainly because they are cheap.

Premier Scott of Saskatchewan is also the editor of the Regina Leader. He was born in 1857, was first elected to the House of Commons in 1900 and re-elected in 1904. He has now abandoned the federal field to lead his party in Saskatchewan. Premier Scott is an able speaker and writer, and was prominently spoken of as a probable successor to Hon. Mr. Sifton in the federal Cabinet at the time of the latter's retirement from that position.

LET THE SCHOOLS EXHIBIT.

It would be an interesting feature of the coming Exhibition if our public schools, and especially our consolidated schools, would make a display of such portions of their work as can be presented in this way. In other Provinces and States there are liberal prizes for the best work to be competed for at public exhibitions of this kind. A healthful stimulus to teachers as well as pupils is thus supplied. We are spending half the revenue of the Province on education and when Exhibition week comes round it would be interesting and profitable to see at the provincial fair some evidence of the good work being done by the schools on which the money is spent. We hope in future years the schools will be encouraged by prizes, so that schools exhibiting may form a prominent feature. The Exhibition should give evidence of the progress our schools are making as well as what ground is being gained in the stockyard, the field and the dairy.

REVENUE STILL BOOMING.

The revenue of the Dominion had expanded so very greatly in recent years that some thoughtful persons had begun to look for an early turn of the tide. The first two months of the current fiscal year, however, instead of showing a falling off, give evidence of a handsome increase over the like months of last year—and last year was a fat one. The increase for the two months was over three quarters of a million dollars, and it is significant that August was the better month of the two, showing a gain of half a million or more over August of 1904. These are notable figures. But it is to be added that the expenditure, including capital account, is more than keeping pace with the growing revenue.

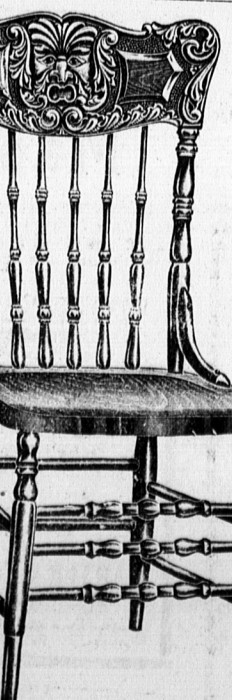
