MAROONS LOSE SUMMERSIDE TO LEAFS 1-0

TORONTO, Dec. 29.—(By The Canadian Press)—King Clancy's shot from the blue line, in the first period, driving past Flat Walsh before he knew it was coming, won Toronto Maple Leafs a National Hockey League game from Montreal Maroons 1-0 here tonight.

Clancy's counter, rather lucky in itself, gave the world champions an edge they deserved on the evening's play. The victory gave Toronto a five point edge in the standing over Ottawa Senators. It was Maroons fifth straight defeat.

Held even in territorial play by the Montrealers in the first period, the Leafs outplayed the Maroons in the second period and held a good edge in the third. Although body checks were handed out right and left, play was fairly clean. Only five penalties were handed out, four of them in the last session.

At one stage in this frame Leafs had an advantage of two men but could do nothing with it. "Happy" Day, veteran defenceman, played a sparkling game for the winners and Clancy, Jackson, Cotton, Darragh, Bailey and Blair were quite up to their usual good games.

DETROIT AND CANUCKS TIE

FORUM, Montreal, Dec. 29.—(By The Canadian Press)—Jack Adams Detroit Red Wings held Les Canadiens to a 3-3 overtime tie in a National Hockey League game here tonight before a crowd of 9,000.

Two goals down at the end of the first period, Canadiens tallied once in the second and tied the game half way through the third. Both teams scored again in the third and the deadlock could not be broken in 10 minutes of overtime.

Ebbie Goodfellow notched two of the first period, and Wiseman the other, while Morenz, Lepine and Gerald Carson were the habitant marksmen.

P. E. I. Battery Wins Second Place
