### MRS. DOXEY'S CASE UP AGAIN

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 9.—After having been postponed through nine terms of court because of the alleged illness of the defendant, the case of Mrs. Dora Doxeey-Whitney was taken up in the St. Louis County court at Clayton to-day for trial. Mrs. Whitney has been a defendant in the courts of this vicinity for four years, first on a charge of murder, and then on a charge of bigamy. She first was indicted after William J. Erder, a St. Louis postal clerk she married at Clayton, died, leaving her an insurance policy on his life. A trial in this city on the murder charge resulted in an acquittal. Mrs. Doxeey, as she then was, and her husband, Dr. Loren B. Doxeey, then went to Tennessee. Dr. Doxeey's body later was found in the Tennessee River at Clifton, Tenn. It was reported a case of suicide. In the meantime Mrs. Doxeey had been indicted for bigamy, on the ground that she had married Erder while still the wife of Dr. Doxeey. Soon after the death of Dr. Doxeey the widow went to Greer, Idaho, where she married a man named Whitney. Whitney is her sixth husband.

Serious Consequences Almost Sure to Follow Constant Taking

### NO WOMAN LAWYERS IN GREAT BRITAIN

#### Many Countries However, Admit Them to the Bar—Some Views on Both Sides of the Question

By an overwhelming majority a large meeting of British barristers, distinguished and otherwise, rejected, at the Inner Temple Hall a proposal that women should be permitted to practise at the Bar. In France, Russia, Switzerland, the United States, and many British dominions, including Canada, women are allowed to practise as barristers, and many of them have proved ornaments of the Bar in more senses than one.

It seems to be purely owing to old-fashioned prejudice that ladies are not allowed to invade the legal profession in England in the manner in which they have invaded other professions hitherto deemed the prerogative of man. And it was this prejudice which aroused the indignation of Miss Christabel Pankhurst some years ago when, after taking the degree of bachelor of law with honors at the Victoria University, Manchester, in 1905, she was refused admission as a law student at Lincoln's Inn.

**A Woman's Opinion**

Curiously enough, at the time members of the English Bar were discussing whether women should be admitted to the legal profession, Mrs. Ethel de Costa, LL.B., a lady who practises as a lawyer and solicitor in the Supreme Court of New Zealand, arrived in England on a visit. Mrs. de Costa is convinced that the time will come when women will practise in the English Courts. She is sure that women are eminently fitted for certain classes of legal work, particularly matrimonial and separation cases, in many of which she has appeared for the woman, her clients being principally ladies, although her services are sought by a fair sprinkling of men.

Similar views are held by Mrs. Rachel Vuille, who was admitted to the Bar in Geneva.

**Brilliant Advocate**

Mrs. Vuille did not take up law from a financial point of view, but simply to help women, though she receives men clients. "I think," she says, "the woman lawyer can defend a woman prisoner, especially in penal cases, better than a man counsel because there is more sympathy between women, and in delicate cases a woman will confide more to a female lawyer than to a man."

On the other hand, Chief Justice Sir John Madden of Australia, considers that ladies entering the legal profession are handicapped by nature and sex. "Women," said Chief Justice Madden when Miss Greta Flos-Maffia Greig, the first lady barrister of the Commonwealth, was called to the Bar in Melbourne, "are naturally more sympathetic than judicial, more emotional than logical. Besides, knowledge of the world is quite as essential to success at the Bar as knowledge of the law."

At the present time there are over a dozen lady barristers in France, and in the States women have practised at the Bar for some thirty years, and altogether there are some forty women barristers appearing in the courts in that country.
