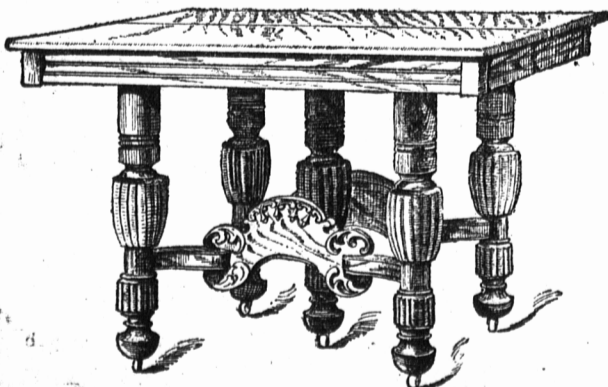

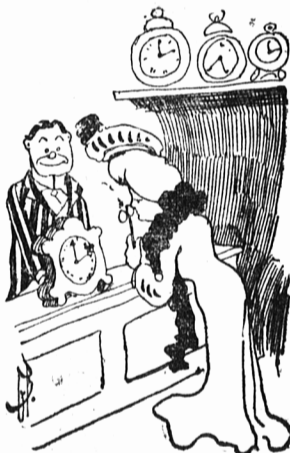

A BIG TASK.

A St. Petersburg despatch says:—In an outspoken article in reply to a recent letter of Admiral Birlett, which appealed to the Russians not to openly criticize the condition of the navy, The Russ today declares:—"The time is passed for silence, in view of the fact that the 'old' system of concealing facts is responsible for the loss of 150,000,000 roubles worth of warships, and has covered us with shame and grief. It would be absurd to hide defects that can still be repaired in the ships which remain at Cronstadt and Liban. We have already criminally wasted enough time." The Russ enumerates the defects in the ships still in Russian waters, averring that the "peculiarities of structure of several of the vessels destined for the far east make the voyage dangerous, and the torpedo boats are in such a shocking condition that it is a matter of surprise that the authorities accepted their delivery. Torpedo boats intended to reinforce Vice-Admiral Rojstevsky must clearly not be despatched with the numerous defects that have been proved to exist in them." In conclusion The Russ says:—"Even if Admiral Rojstevsky is a clever leader and his 12,000 comrades are heroic sailors, every one knows that we have imposed on them an almost superhuman task in consequence of our not being furnished with a true account of the gravity of the events which have occurred since the fatal night of February 8."

Tenders for Conveying Children.

Sealed Tenders will be received by the undersigned until January 17th, 1905 for the conveyance of school children to the McDonald Consolidated School at Pilsbore (Mount Herbert) every day the school is in session between the dates May 1st, 1905, and Dec 31st, 1905, inclusive.

Route No. 1. Hazelbrook extends from the Mt. Michael McDonald's along the Lot 48 Road via McKenzie's Corner to the school.

Route No. 2 from Bethel by nearest road to school.

Route No. 3 from Mermaid by nearest road to school.

Route No. 4 from Bunsbury by nearest road to school.

Route No. 5 extends from Mr. Dan McRae's, Tea Hill, via Cross Roads to Mr. Frank Ferguson's.

Route No. 6 extends from the last house in Kilmek (McInnis) to Cross Roads, also conveying pupils on the route east of Mr. Frank Ferguson's.

CONDITIONS 1. Drivers will be required to sign a contract. 2. The contractor will be supplied with a van. 3. The contractor must furnish horse or horse and driver. 4. The driver shall wait not longer than two minutes at a collecting point for children. 5. Vans will pass along the main road in each district. 6. No pupils over school age shall be conveyed in vans. 7. No children over twelve years of age, who reside within one and a half miles of school shall be conveyed in vans. 8. All other children who reside more than one mile from the school to be conveyed.
