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STILL HAS CONFIDENCE IN "DEATH RAY"

British Inventor Arrives in U. S.—Says His Invention Not Yet Perfected.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., July 20.—Zealously guarding the secret of his invention, known internationally as the "death ray" M. Grindell Matthews, the English inventor arrived Saturday on the steamship Paris for a short visit to this country. He declared that he had come to the United States to interest the government or any one else in his invention. The inventor's first statement upon arrival was that the use of the term "death ray" for his device was a misnomer. He said it was in reality an "electric beam" and that he had never called it anything else. The inventor declared that the ray could, if "properly developed", destroy a city like New York. He also stated it could "paralyze" whole armies. "At present," he said, "my ray operates upon half a kilowatt. I am now developing a machine in England that will operate on fifty kilowatts. In the course of six or eight months I shall so perfect my invention that I will have a ray that could work great destruction." He declared that four or five nations had offered large sums for the invention, but that upon its perfection it would be offered to Great Britain and no other nation. He denied that he took a trip to France to interest the French government in it. "The inventor said his claim that the ray would paralyze armies was based upon experiments in which it "killed" mice and four rats. "The tests in which the British government experts found the ray to be harmless, was unfavorable because he did not "have time to make the proper arrangements, being rushed and crowded." The fear that his invention might be used by spies caused him to conduct his experiments on an island in the English channel, he said.

Naval Units Hold Church Parade

Raymond who delivered an appropriate and powerful sermon from the text "Love thy neighbor as thyself." A very fine vocal solo was rendered by Mr. Chas. Earle. During the march both to and from the church, many complimentary remarks were heard relative to the fine appearance and excellent marching of both units.

Death of Veteran Anglican Clergyman

(Canadian Press) ST. JOHN, N. B., July 20.—The death occurred here today of Rev. James White Millidge, veteran Anglican clergyman, aged 83 years. He was a chaplain in the Imperial army in India in his early life and later came to Oak Bay, Charlotte County, where he was in charge of that parish for thirty years. He retired a few years ago, and had been preaching as a supply until a few days before his death. He leaves besides his wife, three daughters, one sister and two brothers.

Scrap 2 Battleships Worth 20 Millions

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 20.—Workmen at the Navy Yard in Brooklyn have completed the dismantling of two battleships which were to have been named Indiana and South Dakota. The government appropriated \$60,000,000 for these vessels, of which \$20,000,000 was received to scrap them in accordance with provisions of the Washington disarmament agreement. By cutting up the steel the government received between \$75,000 and \$100,000 more than would have been received had the ships been sold as they stood to the highest bidder. The steel was bought by the Steel Scrap Company of Philadelphia at \$9.51 a ton.

WHAT WOOL GRADING MEANS FOR CANADIAN FARMERS

Increased Price For Graded Wool Has Netted \$1,500,000 To Canadian Wool Growers Since 1914 When Wool Grading System Was Inaugurated.

Mr. G. D. Preliminary motions for the trial are to be heard Monday.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, July 20.—The Prime Minister announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the government would next session seek to establish the rights of the House of Commons over the Senate with respect to legislation initiated in the House of Commons. The privileges sought would be similar to those held by the British House in respect to the House of Lords.

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STORM TAKES HEAVY TOLL OF SHIPS AND LIVES.

Twenty fishing smacks are missing from Ostend and it is feared more are lost. Ten more boats are missing from Portsmouth and 15 persons are reported drowned. The storm seems to have blown itself out and better weather is the forecast.
