WEEKLY WIRELESS & ELECTRICITY LETTER

During the past few years there has been a marked effort on the part of the railroads to light more trains by electricity. Explosions of illuminating gas and fires caused by dripping oil lamps were the direct cause of this movement towards electric lighting.

The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad was a pioneer in this new system of lighting and it is interesting to note that our own Great Northern, The Canadian Pacific, has now installed this system on the greater part of its through lines.

The Canadian Pacific Railway now dispatches trains over 2,254 miles of track by means of the Telephone.

A "Wireless" station capable of communicating with vessels at a distance of 2,000 or possibly 3,000 miles, will be erected at Fort Meyer.

satisfied that man takes off his hat to her and toils for her day and night. Asserts her right to vote in election and to help make the laws and govern the country. Has conquered Australia, New Zealand, Finland, Iceland, many States of the American Union to her will and has set the battle in array in all civilized lands for a like share in the supreme authority. What do we see in England today? Women of rank and station, daughters of the nobility, along with their more lowly sisters, battering at the gates of Parliament, and smashing windows after the manner of Carrie Nation. And they may carry the nation yet, appalling and intolerable as the prospects may appear.

Talk about the insurrection in China as if it were a big thing of its kind! Why there are eight hundred millions of Eve's daughters in the world and it they will take to "smashing" there will be no end of trouble. Even now the Lord of Creation sits on a precarious throne. Tomorrow he may borrow leave to be.

PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION.

So great a man as Lord Grey, late Governor General of Canada, is giving his attention to the question of proportional representation. We may therefore conclude that the subject is well worth considering. But some man may ask, how can the representation of minorities be brought about? A simple plan, and one which has been tried with good results, is that of having three-member constituencies and the cumulative vote. This means that each electoral division should return three members and each elector have two votes only, but with the right to cast both votes for one candidate should he choose to do so.

For illustration, let us suppose the Province divided into ten electoral divisions instead of fifteen as at present. Each division having three members, would leave us a House of thirty members as at present. In nearly every electoral division there is a recognized majority for one party or the other. In such case the party in the majority would nominate two or three candidates as the case might be, and the minority would nominate one candidate. The election might then go by acclamation, or, if it came to a vote, the minority voters would each cast two votes for their one candidate and could thus easily elect him. In districts where parties are of nearly equal strength each party might name three candidates, but neither party would be likely to elect three, owing to the cumulative vote which would be pretty sure to elect the favorite candidate of the minority over the least popular of the men running on the other side.

AN HISTORIC PRECEDENT.

The Sydney Post in a second forcible article on the right of the Maritime Provinces to compensation for the extension of the boundaries of the western Provinces points to a precedent in the United States. By an act of Congress passed in 1860 large and valuable tracts of public lands in the American West were given to every one of the older States, for the endowment of agricultural colleges and the maintenance of technical education in the individual States. This act is known as the Morrill Land College Act and by vir-

ue of it the Eastern States now hold valuable western lands or enjoy the revenue derived therefrom. And so large is the revenue that practically every State in the American union today has a well-equipped agricultural college whose main endowment, and chief financial support is derived from the sale of the lands thus set apart by the Morrill act.

The parallel with our case is about as perfect as can be. The reasons why Congress thus conferred western lands on eastern States were that it was the original States which, acting through Congress, in 1803 had purchased the vast Louisiana territory from France, and that it was largely eastern money that had developed, colonized and opened up these western lands. Our case is clear enough under this precedent. It was the money of the eastern Provinces which purchased the Northwest Territory from the Hudson Bay Company and which has since at great cost opened up the lands to settlement, built railways there, and paid the millions which the immigration to the west has cost.

There was never a better opportunity, if one so good, for us to successfully assert our rights and gain a much-needed addition to our provincial revenues. But so far as The Guardian can learn there is nothing doing or done on our behalf in any of these matters. The provincial Government is in no position to do anything, especially since the paralyzing blow it received in the recent bye-elections. Nor can we see any reasonable chance of anything being effectively done until we have a strong Government placed in power and backed up by the support of the people at large.

Obviously it is only some one with a clear and unmistakable mandate from the people who can rightfully undertake to speak for the Province and bind it by his action in such far-reaching and weighty matters as these. Premier Palmer would, we think, hesitate and rightly hesitate in his present circumstances, to assume so grave a responsibility. We believe he desires to pursue a strictly constitutional and honorable course of action and will as speedily as is practicable break the existing deadlock and place the responsibility of leadership where by the voice of the people it clearly belongs.
