The flour market is firm and indications are that prices will remain steady for some time.

SCHOONER PURCHASED—Captain Charles Dunn, Murray Harbor North, arrived in Victoria last week to take charge of the Schooner "W. Parnell O'Hara" which he purchased from Messrs E. Boswell and A. McLean, through the medium of an "ad" in the Guardian. This vessel is in excellent condition and has a 27 h. p. gasoline engine installed, which will move her six miles an hour. "W. Parnell" has a great advantage over schooners with out this propelling power, especially in calm weather or in getting in or out of the harbors when the wind is not favourable.—V.

DEHORNING OF CATTLE—This is the time of year for farmers to dehorn cattle. It has been shown time and again that the dehorned cattle are quieter than cattle which have their horns and if milch cows they are more easily managed and give an increased quantity of milk. The horns can be taken off with either a saw or a dehorner. The latter is the easiest and simplest and is probably the least painful to the cow. If the operation is done later the horn may not heal before the flies become bothersome. If it is done now there is no danger of the cow taking cold. There is really no risk attending the operation and farmers should dehorn all their yearling cattle.

IMPORTANT ACT—One of the most important measures passed at the recent session of the Legislature was the act incorporating the Co-Operative Seed Association. Its object is to encourage the production and marketing of pure seed. For some time past the Banner oat Club has been in operation. There were several difficulties in connection with its working one of which was sampling and sending to the market a uniform according to sample. It is now proposed, however, that the oats of the members shall be stored in warehouses so that they may be sampled and prices given on application. The egg trade of the Province has benefited immensely by the Co-Operative Egg and Poultry Association, and it is expected that the seed growers will benefit by this new act. Every farmer who expects to join the Association should sow the very best quality of oats he can buy and it is understood that the Association will operate with only Banner oats during the coming season.

TEMPERANCE MEETING—A ringing and enthusiastic temperance meeting was held Thursday night in the Methodist church in Victoria at which the Rev. W. D. Wilson, Field Secretary, and Mr. David Schurman, Sec'y Treasurer, of the Temperance Alliance were the principal speakers at the evening. Rev. G. M. Young in introducing these gentlemen stated that he had implicit faith in them and after hearing the temperance question set forth in its various phases it was evident that the large audience concurred in his opinion. Several persons in the audience asked questions of the speakers and made a few remarks which greatly assured in enlivening the meeting. Dr. Boyer spoke very favorably of the Provincial Patriotic Abstinence Movement and urged that everyone follow the noble example of the King and take the pledge, at the first opportunity to abstain from intoxicating liquors during the continuation of the war. Then the question was put to the audience asking them to stand thereby signifying their willingness to sign the pledge when given this opportunity almost the entire gathering rose as one man. It seemed quite evident by the unanimous manner in which the large audience evidenced their desire for a forward move in the temperance work that the liquor traffic and liquor dealers have had their day.—V.

NEW YORK, April 21—An English naval officer who arrived yesterday from Malta on his way to Vancouver, said that in spite of the many obstacles in the path, the Dardanelles would be forced before June 1.
