—NEARLY A TRAGEDY—A very narrow escape from drowning was effected at Schurman's Point, near Summerside, on Wednesday afternoon when Mrs. Lee Horn and Miss Mildred Nuttall, of Summerside, ventured out too far when bathing and would have drowned but for the timely arrival of several young men and girls, Miss Nuttall has a particularly close call, as she was considerably beyond her depth and was going down for the third time when the rescuers, using oars for a support drew her to the shore.

—NEW REGULATIONS—Until the new motor vehicle bye-law has been adopted the town government of Summerside is refusing parking privileges to motor car owners in Summer street between the town building and Water street. This has been the most thickly congested motor section of the town and is providing activity for Police Officer Todd, who is notifying the car owners regarding the new regulations.

—PICNICERS—A large number of motorists left Summerside yesterday to attend the farmers picnic at Darnley. Among the speakers at the picnic were Hon. W. A. Lea, commissioner of agriculture, as well as Messrs King and Carr. Rain, which some of the clergy-men and farmers had been praying for, interfered somewhat with the picnic festivities but was eagerly welcomed by the farmers present.

—NEW BY-LAW—A by-law regarding motor traffic in the town of Summerside is being prepared and will be submitted by Councilor E. W. Manson before a special meeting of the town fathers, to be called this week. The by-law deals with the method of turning corners, parking, speed limit and other matters that have been under discussion for the last few months and has been necessitated by the large number of motor vehicles owned in and operated in the town. It has been said that Summerside, for its population, has the largest percentage of motor cars in the Maritime Provinces.
