TORONTO MARKETS

The dressed poultry supply is much inadequate to meet requirements of the trade, and dealers find it difficult to secure supplies. The market is very firm at 35c to 36c for turkeys, 35c to 36c for milk-fed chickens, 31c to 33c for No. 1 stock, 27c to 30c for No. 2, 23c to 30c for fowl, 26c to 30c for ducks, and 24c to 28c for geese. Toronto wholesalers are paying 26c to 28c for dressed chickens, 23c to 25c for fowl, 23c to 24c for ducks, 21c to 22c for geese, and 28c to 30c a lb for turkeys. For dressed poultry retailers are paying 30c to 33c for spring chickens, 32c to 35c for milk-fed chicks, 26c to 30c for fowl; 35c to 40c for turkeys 27c to 30c for spring ducks and 27c to 28c for geese; for live weight, 30c for turkeys 22c to 26c for spring chickens 22c to 28c for hens, 25c for spring ducks, and 15c to 17c for geese.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—Notable improvement in the last two or three weeks in what he calls "the coming-out atmosphere," is remarked by the labor correspondent of The Times. The coming-out of men from protected occupations under the Military Service Bill is now in progress. Nevertheless, the correspondent says, the past week is the first in many months in which there has not been a stoppage of work in any part of the country in consequence of grievances among the workers. Moreover, large numbers of young engineers are coming voluntarily to the recruiting offices and are not waiting to be summoned. The correspondent while not ad-
