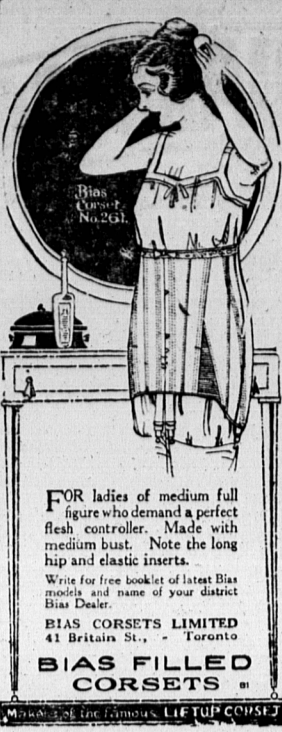

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Meeting of Catholic Women's League

The Charlottetown Sub-division C. W. L. resumed its monthly meetings for the fall season on Tuesday evening, Sept. 4th in Rosary Hall and were favoured by having as the first lecturer of the season Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, M. L. A. who by request, gave an admirable lecture on "First Aid." He outlined clearly and succinctly the methods to be used, and the remedies to be administered in cases of accident and illness, whereby the patient may be rendered as comfortable as possible and danger eliminated in as far as possible until the services of a physician would be secured. Observation, tact, resourcefulness, coolness are all necessary traits for obtaining the best results in sudden attacks of illness or accident, and everyone should have some knowledge along these lines so as to act intelligently and for the benefit of the patient. All forms of sudden illness such as Apoplexy, Convulsions, Hysterical and Apopleptic fits, ordinary fainting spells from various causes were explained as to their cause and the proper method of procedure for those present as was also accidents where bleeding was the danger to overcome, as from wounds or hemorrhage from the nose, throat, or ear. Broken and fractured bones with the consequent care necessary was fully dealt with as were accidents from poisons and drowning. In all it was a most interesting and educative discourse and all the members present were loud in their expressions of gratitude to Dr. McMillan for his splendid lecture. Mrs. Margaret M. Murphy voiced the sentiments of the meeting when she gracefully moved a vote of thanks which was seconded by Mrs. Frank Murray, and presented by 1st Vice-President, Mrs. J. J. Johnson who occupied the chair in the unavoidable absence of the president Mrs. F. J. Casey. A piano solo by Miss Marion Duggan was heartily enjoyed after which the business of the meeting was presented. The report of the convener of committee of re-mailing Catholic literature, Mrs. P. T. Murphy, was read and received much commendation for the splendid work accomplished in this line and the surprisingly large volume this very recent venture has already attained, meeting with enthusiastic response from Diocesan clergy.

The report of the Little Flower Recreation Camp submitted by Mrs. W. J. MacIntyre, convener of Juvenile Welfare was also an excellent one giving a detailed account of Camp management and results attained. She ended with a plea for a greater interest and sympathy for our young girls who in a decade or more will be the hope of our congregation and our community. Mrs. (Dr.) J. D. McGuigan was elected a delegate to the Diocesan Convention Catholic Women's League which will take place in Charlottetown, October 2nd and 3rd and at which every sub-division of the province will be represented by its president and to which all members of each and every sub-division is cordially invited. Charlottetown sub-division nominated the following entertainment committee to assist the president Mrs. P. T. Murphy, Mrs. J. H. Monaghan, Mrs. Peter McDonald, Mrs. Jas. Kiggins and Mrs. John McGuigan and it is planned to make this the first annual Diocesan Convention C. W. L., a successful one. A number of new members were welcomed and after singing the National Anthem the meeting adjourned.

Mrs. Edward Bullpitt's pen of White Leghorns continues to lead the contest with 1705 eggs. Mr. D. F. McDonald pen of Barred Rocks second with 1638 eggs. The Experimental Stations pen of White Leghorns No. 18 third with 1678 eggs. Mr. J. J. Gilliary's pen of White Leghorns fourth with 1649 eggs. The Experimental Stations pen of White Leghorns No. 15 fifth with 1640 eggs. Mr. Everett Howland's pen of White Leghorns sixth with 1621 eggs, and Mr. Pendleton Bros. Barred Rocks seventh with 1534 eggs.

Mr. D. F. McDonald's pen of Barred Rocks laid 199 eggs for the 11 four weekly period. The Experimental Stations pen of White Leghorns No. 15 laid 195 for the same period, and Mr. D. M. Robinson's pen of White Wyandottes laid 173 eggs.

Today seven hens have laid over 200 eggs thus qualifying in the Record of Performance. Seventy five hens have laid over 150 eggs.

Gigantic Animal That Frightened An Island

(By Dominion News Service). LONDON, Sept. 7.—A rare and ferocious animal, the fossa, which the natives of Madagascar hold in awe, has arrived at the Zoological Gardens here.

It has the appearance of a gigantic weasel, but is really a connecting link between the cats and civets. The Zoo has not had a specimen for over a decade.

The donor J. H. Helyar, British Consul in Madagascar, has employed a collector for two years, trying to obtain a specimen for the Zoo, but owing to the fossa being nocturnal, ferocious and active all previous efforts have been unsuccessful.

Flossie was captured on Mount Andray, at a height of 15,000 feet. The fossa is the largest (it measures 5 ft. from nose to tail-tip), and tries to "rule the roost." It is not charged with chicken-stealing and tearing out the throats of horses, but devouring native children.

Flossie, who was brought over by Mr. Helyar personally certainly acted up to this reputation during the voyage, for, ignoring her rations she flew at the cook's face inflicting a severe wound.
