## Merit Sole Qualification For Judges' Appointment

## NOVA SCOTIA BEER PRICES ARE REDUCED

### New Price For Domestic Beer Fifteen Cents a Pint—Labor Organizations Responsible For Reduction.

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 15.—Nova Scotia is to have its beer under the Government control system which goes into effect on Monday, at a net price of 12½ cents per bottle, after a conference of the Government with the Liquor Control Board today. Premier G. S. Harrington announced that a new price for domestic beer of fifteen cents a pint or \$1.80 the dozen had been established. Deducting a thirty cent refund for returned bottles, the 12½ cent figure is arrived at.

Protests from several quarters, particularly labor organizations, at the published price of 25 cents a pint, led to the conference. The Commission estimates that no profits, at least during the first year, will accrue from its transactions in beer, but have met the wish of the Government, so that one of the chief ideas back of the plebiscite, the substitution so far as possible, of malt liquors for spirits may be made effective. The Premier coupled his announcement with an appeal for whole-hearted support of the Government Control law.

## Schooner Sinks

NORFOLK, Vt., Aug. 15.—The British schooner Kathleen, which left New York yesterday for the British Isles has gone down at sea, according to information received here.

Mrs. Charles Lockie of Portsmouth whose brother E. L. Sturgis was aboard, received a telegram from New York saying that the schooner sank but giving no information as to the safety of those on board.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 15.—The 738 ton British steam schooner, Kathleen is the only vessel of that name listed in available shipping registers. She is owned by J. Milligen and Co. Ltd. and her port of registry is Belfast. She was built in 1902. There was no immediate information as to whether she was the vessel reported in Norfolk despatches as having sunk.

### Premier Bennett Stresses High Qualifications For Judiciary At Bar Association Meeting. Many Outstanding British Jurists Present.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 15.—In his Presidential address before the Canadian Bar Association today, Premier R. B. Bennett declared: "As President of the Association and as a member of Parliament I want to state unequivocally, that so long as I have power and influence, the appointment of our Judges will have regard to the real qualifications which they must have to occupy high positions to administer our law." Mr. Bennett pressed on the younger members of the Bar the high position of trust which the profession represented and warned against falling into any grooves from a monetary standpoint.

The most outstanding party of British legal figures ever to visit Canada arrived in Toronto today from Ottawa and were met at the Union Station by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada and President of the Canadian Bar Association, which opens its annual session at the Royal York Hotel today. With Mr. Bennett were Col. Price, Attorney General of Ontario; Mr. Justice Masten of the Supreme Court of Ontario, and Angus McMurphy, K. C., representing the C. P. R.

## Bought Some Medals, Won His Girl But Lands In Hoosgow As Bogus Hero

DETROIT, Aug. 15.—Benjamin Lee couldn't win his girl's love with his resplendent theatre usher's uniform, so he bought some medals, won the girl, and today he is in jail as a bogus hero.

Dined and honored by Detroit Veterans' organizations as one of Michigan's war heroes, Benjamin, a theatre usher, appeared wearing the Croix de Guerre, the Distinguished Service Cross, and the Congressional Medal of Honor. He told lurid stories of his part in the war.

Some of the veterans became suspicious. They figured out that Benjamin was about 12 years old when the war started.

Department of Justice agents questioned Benjamin, and he confessed that his tales of heroism were designed to win the love of the girl who now is his wife. He said he purchased the medals from veterans who were "short of cash," and that after his marriage his wife carried on the tales of heroism until the affair got out of his control.

## The Situation In India

As a result of the transfusion, the bulletin said there was a slight increase in the patient's general strength. The statement added that Lord Birkenhead's chest condition remained satisfactory.

## IMPORTS EXCEEDED EXPORTS

### Canada Imported Approximately Eight Million Dollars More Than She Exported.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 15.—Canada's total exports of domestic produce for the month of July totalled \$76,427,505 in the corresponding month last year the total was \$100,219,440. Foreign produce exported through Canadian ports last month totalled \$1,498,118, whereas in July of last year it was \$3,466,734. Canada's total imports for consumption during the month under review totalled \$84,492,843 as against \$114,200,884 in July 1929. It will thus be seen that Canada's imports exceeded her exports by approximately eight million dollars.

## 600 HOURS IN THE AIR

## Potato Famine Is Predicted

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 15.—A potato famine was predicted tonight in this district, when it was learned that there would be no late crop. Today prices jumped 25 cents a bag, and another advance of 25 cents was forecast for tomorrow, which will make potatoes about \$2.25 a bag here. Wholesale dealers reported that they were arranging to go to Leamington for potatoes as none were to be had here. The intense heat has dried the ground and withered the plants.

## Bennett To Be Banquetted In The Autumn

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 15.—Toronto Conservatives will tender a reception to Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada and Leader of the Liberal Conservative Party in the Dominion in the early autumn. This was announced from the central headquarters yesterday, when Secretary Garrett A. Tyrrell stated that already plans are being formulated for such an event. It is expected that coincident with the party reception, there will also be a civic reception and it is quite possible that Toronto being the Capital of the Province, arrangements will be made whereby the demonstration will take on a provincial aspect.

Mr. Bennett, in paying his first visit today to Toronto since his elevation to the Prime Minister's chair, comes as President of the Canadian Bar Association and his time in the city will be fully occupied with the functions with the Association's convention.

## Martial Law Proclaimed

SIMLA, India, Aug. 15.—Martial law was proclaimed today in Peshawar and the surrounding districts, which for a fortnight have been besieged by Afridi tribesmen.

## Stiff Penalty Provided For Drunken Drivers

SYDNEY, Aug. 15.—The minimum sentence which now can be imposed by a magistrate upon a person found guilty of operating an automobile while intoxicated is 30 days in the county jail, according to a revised section of the Criminal Code received here this afternoon by the local police officials. Under the old section the minimum was 7 days in the county jail. The maximum has been increased from 30 to 60 days.

## ENCOURAGING

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 15.—The responses received from the provinces and municipalities in connection with the enquiries sent out from the Department respecting unemployment conditions, manifest an encouraging desire to cooperate with the Dominion Government, declared Hon. Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor here today. The Minister expressed gratification over the large number of replies he had already received.

About the beginning of next week, he said, I expect to be in a position to issue a summary to the press, giving a general picture of the conditions with which the Government desires to deal. The Minister is leaving for Toronto tonight and expects to return either on Monday or Tuesday morning.

## Prospect Good For Increased C.P.R. Earnings

## R-100 MAY RETURN TO CAN. IN SEPTEMBER

### To Inaugurate Regular Trans-Atlantic Commercial Air Travel.

## Chicago Gunman Is Shot Down From Ambush

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—Danny Vallo, notorious gunman and a suspect in the St. Valentine's day massacre, was shot to death from ambush last night in Niles Center, a north-west suburb.

Two men jumped from behind a clump of bushes and shot down Vallo as he alighted from his automobile with a woman companion in front of a roadhouse. Forty shotgun slugs were found in the gangster's body.

## Island Man Is Head Of Gyros

DAVID BETHUNE IS ELECTED MARITIME PRESIDENT

FREDERICTON, Aug. 15.—David Bethune, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., a former Lieutenant-Governor, was elected Governor of Gyro District No. 6, embracing the Maritimes, at the annual convention here this morning.

Election of officers took place at a general business meeting held in a local hotel and attended by the majority of the two hundred delegates. The new Lieutenant Governor is C. R. Hawkins, Fredericton barrister, who has been active with the local organization. The secretary treasurer will be chosen by the Governor and Lieutenant-Governor. It was decided to hold next year's convention at Saint John, N. B., in August.

## Double Tragedy

## Europeans Will Be Barred From Canada For Time

### Discontinuance Of Immigration From Europe Is Announced As Policy Of Government—Purpose Is To Prevent Persons Coming To This Country Who Will Not Be Able To Find Work On Arrival.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 15.—Discontinuance of immigration from the continent of Europe is announced today as the policy of the Government by Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Immigration and Colonization, with the exception of farmers of suitable type, who are in possession of ample means to immediately establish and maintain themselves on farms and the wives and children of persons already established in Canada. This policy, said Mr. Gordon, is rendered necessary by reason of the unemployment in Canada.

## R-100 WILL REACH HOME THIS MORNING

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The British dirigible R-100 notified the Air Ministry tonight that it expected to make landfall at Galway Bay about 3 a. m. G. M. T. (10 p. m. Friday E. S. T.) Galway Bay is on the west central coast of Ireland. If the R-100 files in a bee-line for Cardington it probably will take her at least six hours to reach the home port, which would make the landing around 4 a. m.

## Prov. Called Onta(w)rio by British Accent Authority

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The British Broadcasting Corporation recently became the self-appointed teacher of its millions of listeners concerning the pronunciation of proper names, and now it publishes from time to time a list of names reviewed by its advisory committee with their correct pronunciation.

Last night the announcer speaking to the Radio listeners of the British Isles had a pleasant reference to the presence here of a representative from the Ontario Government's motion picture bureau. The announcer's speech like that of Peter, betrayed him as coming not from Galilee but from Oxford. At any rate he called the Province of Ontario with a long a. It reminded some listeners of the British schoolmasters who used to instruct their pupils concerning the Province of Manitoba (r).

Whether the broadcasting committee proposes to insist this is the proper method of pronouncing Ontario is at present unknown. Anyhow the province had a fine advertisement last night. And this announcer's efforts are nothing to what Canadian newcomers here can do with some English place names. You hear them struggle desperately with Cirencester for example.
