"Yes, Neil has very good taste," I replied, quietly drawing the envelope toward me as I spoke of the fine view from the windows.

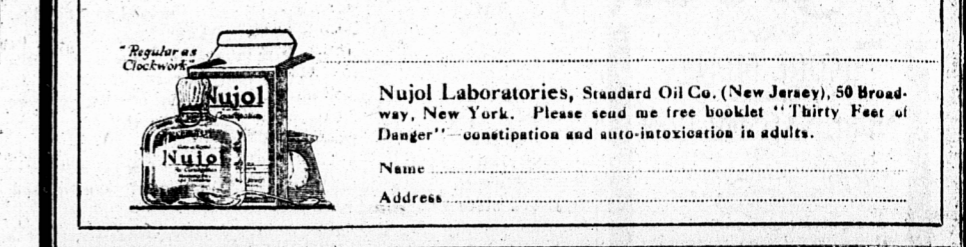
