After the cheese sale the proposition which Messrs Davis and Fraser are submitting to the farmers of the Island was brought up and discussed. All the members of the board expressed themselves as strongly opposed to the Government guaranteeing the bonds of the Dominion Packing Company and generally in favor of Messrs Davis & Fraser's proposition. The following resolution was unanimously carried by a standing vote. Resolved, that this meeting of the Cheese Board would in view of the published proposition of Messrs Davis & Fraser regarding the erection of a pork and meat Packing factory in the province respectfully urge all Cheese and Butter Companies and Farmers Institutes to take the said proposition in their favorable consideration, call meetings and send the actions taken at such meetings to the secretary of the Cheese Board, R. Jenkins, within this month.

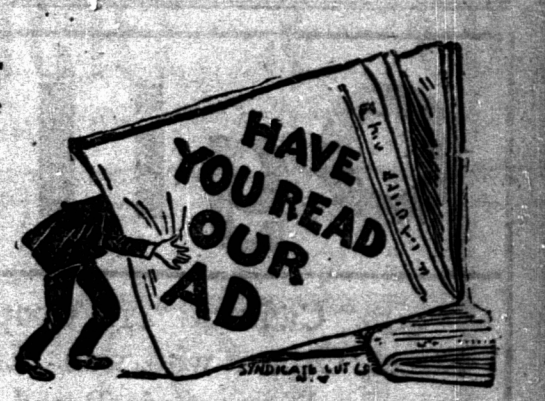
