GOVERNMENT TELEGRAPHS.

The Toronto Globe mentions with favor the report that the federal Government is negotiating for the purchase of the telegraph lines with a view to taking over and conducting the telegraph business of the country. The Globe says:—

It is to be hoped that the report is well-founded. The telegraph is a first cousin to the postoffice, and it seems reasonable that both should be under Government control. That party might have an undue influence in appointments is an objection which occurs to one at first sight; but we find no complaint that the postoffice is in incompetent hands, or that the service is prejudiced by party consideration.

The telegraph is conducted by the Government in Great Britain, and we hear no complaints that it is inefficient, or that telegrams are delayed or tampered with for party reasons. It is usually found that men who are placed in positions of trust take a pride in discharging the trust well and faithfully. There are also many things which render it undesirable that a private business corporation should have supervision over so large a mass of correspondence as passes over the wires. It is probable, also, that a reduction of rates could be effected without depressing the wages of operators.

It is not likely that a journal at once so influential and so much in the confidence of the Administration would speak in this way were there not some reasonable probability of the purchase being effected. The situation therefore becomes of especial interest to the people of Prince Edward Island as under a system of Government telegraphs we should speedily find a solution of our present difficulties. Whatever may be said of the scheme in a general way from the broad Canadian viewpoint, from this section of the Dominion it opens an alluring prospect. It would at least give equal rates throughout the entire Dominion, and if at the same time the general rates could be reduced our Province would gain very greatly.

The policy of Government ownership has proved eminently successful in the Mother Country and has long been in vogue in what are now the States of the Australian Commonwealth. So that Government telegraphs may now be said to be the rule rather than the exception in large sections of the British Empire.

The purchase of the telegraph lines would of necessity add some millions to the public debt of the country. But if value is obtained the country would be none the poorer. And we would necessarily have a greatly improved service at less cost than at present in this section of the country, at least.

In the meantime, because of the bounty the people of Great Britain are supplied with sugar at a cheaper rate than the countries where it is produced.
