Held For Trial

TRURO, N. S., July 31.—(By The Canadian Press)—Dr. Arthur R. Casson, and Steven Golde, charged with burning Dr. Casson's cottage at Short's Lake, are held for trial. Dr. Casson on bail of \$6,000.
