## W. M. BROWN HEAVY PROPERT SENT UP TO SUPREME COURT

**John Henry Mitchell Also Committed for Trial—Hearings Opened in S' Side Yesterday.**

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 21.—The preliminary hearing into the case of William Brown, C. N. R. brakeman, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of the late Charles E. MacDonald at Pensacola, Fla., was opened in the Court House in Birmingham yesterday morning at 11 o'clock before Judge McQuarrie.

Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., appeared for the Crown and Mr. Edgar Shaw for the defendant.

The following witnesses were examined:—Wm. Davey, Dr. Bell, William McNeill, Mrs. Crosby, James O'Connell, Vernon Muttart, Morley Muttart, Victor McLean, Vernon Campbell, Mrs. Edith Campbell, Edna Campbell, Edward Leard and James V. MacDonald.

The evidence was practically the same as has already been given in the Guardian.

Mr. D. E. Shaw addressed the Court on behalf of the defendant and Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., for the Crown.

His Honor Judge McQuarrie committed the defendant Brown for trial at the next session of the Supreme Court.

Asked by His Honor if he had anything to say Brown said: "Not guilty."

## Two Lives Were Lost—Captain Fonck and Lieut. Curtin Leaped to Safety Before the Plane Burst Into Flames

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 21.—Expressions of sympathy over the Florida disaster have come to the White House and state department from the heads of many foreign governments. The King of Great Britain and the regent of Hungary addressed personal messages to President Coolidge, while the British and Japanese ambassadors, the Belgian, German and Swedish called on Frank B. Kellogg, Secretary of State.

The German Charge D'Affaires delivered a note of sympathy from the president of Germany and the German people.

The message from the British king read: "I am shocked to hear of the deplorable disaster which has occurred in Florida resulting in serious loss of life and property. I heartily sympathize with you Mr. President, and the American people with the relatives of all those who have suffered."

## Will Take Oath of Office in Quebec
