MONUMENT TO ACTRESS RACHEL

GENEVA, Oct. 6.—A committee has been formed, English, French and Swiss members, with temporary headquarters in Paris, to erect a monument to the celebrated actress Rachel, who was born at Mumpf, a little town near Zurich. It is proposed to choose the site as near as possible to the birthplace of the Swiss actress, and with this object the local authorities were consulted by the committee, with very satisfactory results.

MANY REBELS KILLED IN CHINA

PEKING, October 6.—Methodist missionaries at Chengtu, the recently besieged capital of Szech Chuen province, telegraphed today that they estimate that 10,000 persons were killed during the fighting between the insurgents and the government troops. Of the dead 2,000 were soldiers and the other rebels. The thousand rebels are in possession of several cities southwest of Chengtu. Soldiers are marching against them today.
