SUCCESSFUL STUDENTS.—By a telegram received by his friends in Charlottetown it is learned that Mr. W. Fred Taylor, eldest son of Ex-Councillor J. D. Taylor, has successfully passed all examinations in connection with his medical course at McGill University, and the degree of M. D. will accordingly be conferred upon him, at the convocation exercises to take place at the University on the 12th of this month. By the results of the examinations in the Medical Faculty of McGill College, just given out, Mr. J. P. Haszard, third-year student in medicine, (son of Mr. Justice Haszard) passed in all subjects, taking first place in Pharmacology and honors in Pathology.

MOTOR CAR PARADE.—A very successful automobile "parade" took place on Wednesday morning. Early notice was all that could be desired, but even with this over thirty cars turned up opposite the Canada Fox Exchange at 11 o'clock. The cars were drawn up in line one after another, that of Mr. B. Roy Holman taking the lead. They moved at slow speed through all the principal streets and around the park. They were filled with visitors from the country who had come to town for the races. Hundreds of spectators lined the streets and watched with great interest the unique procession. The total length of the parade was over a mile. Another "parade" will be held on Thursday evening next, June 11, and some of the owners will likely decorate their cars for the occasion. A number of the cars in Wednesday's parade were dressed with flags.

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY

In an interview given out at Montreal, Mr. J. S. Dennis, assistant to the president, head of the department of natural resources of the Canadian Pacific, and reputed to be one of the best authorities on western affairs, said: Business conditions on the railway as well as in the cities and towns are quiet at the present, but are beginning to show marked evidence of stimulation owing to the splendid spring weather and a consequent early movement of people to the western part of Canada. The abnormal growth of urban centres is credited with causing the depression of the past year. The city development is now waiting for the necessary industrial and agricultural growth to catch up. When the two are more nearly on a level will the prosperity of the past begin to be appreciable again. It is too early now to speak of crop conditions, yet the spring indications are very encouraging and promise a well for excellent crop returns. The immigration to Canada has dropped off to some extent, but this is only due to the holding back of the part of artisans and laborers. The numbers who are taking up land for the purpose of "sane" agricultural development, or mixed farming, as is so diligently preached by the Canadian Pacific, are becoming larger each year. The number of settlers taking up land in the west is larger this year than heretofore. 2762.

DIRECTIONS FOR USING

For Cut Worms. use two ounces to each gallon of water, and apply with a watering can, drenching the ground thoroughly. These worms do not rise to the surface as other worms do, but die in the ground. Apply early in the morning.

For Ants. use two ounces to each gallon of water, mix thoroughly and apply freely with a watering can or spray. These pests may require a third application before you can get rid of them finally.

For Borers. it is a case of prevention rather than cure. The borers come out of the ground and work up the tree, where it is practically impossible to reach them. Thus it is necessary to kill them when they are in the ground.

Use two ounces of the Eradicator to each gallon of water and drench the ground around the tree during the months of April, August, or September.

For Worms at the roots of trees, fruit or vegetables, carefully measure one ounce of the **Worm Eradicator** to each gallon of water; put into a wooden pail; agitate the whole well together, then apply in the ordinary way, using a watering can. For this purpose, during the Summer months it is best to apply it early in the morning.

For Lawns and Golfing Greens, use one ounce to the gallon of water as above.

Be particular to avoid foliage as much as possible. If foliage is treated, it must be washed off a few minutes after.
