SALE OF HORSES—On Saturday last on the Market Square Mr. Benj. Carter sold for Mr. Wallace Stead, Highfield, six head of pure-bred Shorthorn cattle at prices ranging from \$100 to \$216 each. The sale was very largely attended. The Clydesdale horses recently brought to the island by Mr. J. F. McLean were at the same time on exhibition on the square and were introduced by Mr. Carter, the large number of farmers evincing much interest in the fine looking animals.

SUCCESSFUL SALE—The recent sale held at the premises of Mr. Wm. C. Croys of Kingston proved highly successful. Cattle sold as high as \$135 each; hay brought \$25 a ton, loose oats \$1.00 a bushel, while all the stock and implements sold well. Mr. Benj. Carter was the auctioneer. Mr. Croys intends retiring from active farm work and will settle at Kingston Corner.

LOBSTER PACKER'S MEETING—Mr. S. T. Gallant, Inspector of Fisheries, and Mr. Harry Tidmarsh, city, will attend the meeting of lobster packers at Cambridge tomorrow. The packers are fully realizing that the quality of the lobster pack has to be improved over that of previous years in order to hold the markets and it is thought that the best means to be taken is by holding meetings for the exchange of ideas with a view to taking concerted action. The Cambridge meeting will be the first of a series with this object.

INTERVIEWING BARREL MAKERS—Mr. R. Gray, of Halifax, Inspector of Pickled Fish for the Maritime Provinces, arrived in the city on Monday evening to interview the several barrel makers in the Province with the object of having barrels made according to regulations. During the past few days he has been sufficiently strong to retain the pickle, consequently the fish in many cases turned bad. The late Mrs. Brecken was formerly Miss Eaton of St. John, N. B. She is survived by one daughter and two sons.
