### MONDAY.

**PROCLAIMED.**—In the Royal Gazette issued on Saturday, publication is made of the proclamation by which Monday, the 20th of October, is appointed by the Privy Council to be observed as Thanksgiving Day throughout Canada.

**ICE AT GASPE.**—Capt. Lord, of the schooner Iona, which has just arrived from Gaspe with a cargo of shingles for Messrs L. M. Poole & Co., reports that the ice is already making in Gaspe. On the morning he left that port for Charlottetown, for two or three days previously ice had formed on the deck of his vessel.

**LARGE CARGO.**—The schooner Dwina, of Richibucto, Capt. Fraser, arrived here from Newcastle, N. B., yesterday morning with what is creditably stated to be the largest cargo of lumber that has been carried by a vessel of her size. The Dwina is of only sixty tons burthen, and the cargo she brought to Charlottetown consisted of 84,000 feet of spruce boards.

**CONTRACT AWARDED.**—The Dominion Government have made the award of the contract for the construction of the wharf that it is proposed to build on the west side of the North River and closely adjacent to the North River Bridge. The contract has been given to Mr. Joseph Hughes, of Charlottetown, and the work, it is understood, is to be commenced immediately. The completion of this wharf will mean the provision of a great facility to the people of the district.

**ACCIDENT AT THE RAILWAY.**—Saturday forenoon Mr. Edgar Walker, of Mr. and Mrs. Angus Walker, Orlebar St., met with an unfortunate accident. Mr. Walker is in the employ of the M. J. Hogan Woodworking factory and had come over to the Freight Department of the P. E. I. R., in answer to a call, to do some work. While thus engaged he went into a room that had in it a large vat. The room was full of steam from the vat which was filled with boiling water and a solution of acids. The tank, which is seven or eight feet long and three wide, was open and Mr. Walker not knowing it was there walked right into it. He had presence of mind to grasp the sides of the tank till help came which was soon. He was rendered first aid by the railway corps, then taken to his home in the ambulance, where medical treatment was rendered. He is most painfully scalded around the feet and ankles and it will be some time before the injured members will be healed. On enquiry last evening it was found that he was resting as comfortably as could be expected under the circumstances. His wounds though severe are not serious.

**VISITS HIS HOME.**—Dr. James McDonald, Boston, Mass., brother of Dr. A. A. McDonald, Souris, and a native of St. Andrews, arrived in Charlottetown Wednesday night. His principal mission here was with a view to becoming established in the fox business. The doctor is one of the most successful medical men in the "Hub" and enjoys a large practice. The Island is attracting great interest in Boston and Dr. McDonald says the Americans are only becoming alive to the possibilities of the great Island industry. He left on return to Boston Saturday morning.

**LUMBER BOOM.**—There has been this year an unusual activity in the lumber market in this Province, and the cause can be traced to the fox industry. For there has been a great amount of fox-ranch building, not only as regards the pens and houses for the foxes themselves, but in many cases of new dwellings for the keepers of the ranches. Lumbermen have consequently benefited from these circumstances, and there has been a greater importation of lumber into the Island this season than in any other year recently. At Messrs. L. M. Poole & Co., one of the leading lumber merchants of the Island, the lumber imported this year was at the average of a vessel-load a day.

**RETURNED.**—Among those arriving in Charlottetown on Friday night was Mr. Fred Cameron, the popular jockey and one of the best known and best liked men in racing circles in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Cameron returned from Brockton Fair where he had been driving the Nova Scotia horse, Dingola with which he had been so successful at the Halifax Exhibition. On this occasion, however, Fred did not succeed in getting Dingola first past the pole. The race was run in 2:14 and the fastest time in which Dingola won at Halifax was 2:12. Still Fred thinks that his horse ought to have made that time; but, he said, Dingola did not run at his best; he got away badly and did not appear to want to run.

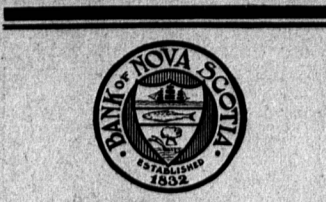
**GIRLS IN TROUBLE.**—The two girls, of ages between sixteen and seventeen, who were arrested in Charlottetown on Friday for having stolen a few dollars' worth of clothing, on the preceding night from the premises of Messrs. E. J. and H. Court, Prince street, were brought before Mr. Magistrate Martin at the City Magistrate's Court, on Saturday. They were defended by Mr. Donald A. McKinnon. The evidence for the prosecution established the identity of the clothes, which had been hanging on lines in the yard, and were missed about nine o'clock at night. Sgt. Bradley, who had effected the arrest of the defendants, and had discovered the missing clothing, deposed as to these circumstances. A portion of the clothing was found under the mattress of the bed in the room occupied by the girls in the house of Mrs. Taylor in which they lived. When this discovery was made, the Sgt., said, Mrs. Taylor said to one of the girls, "Maggie why did you do such a thing?" to which the girl replied, "I am no worse than Katie;" she insisted that the other girl had as much to do with the affair as she had,—a charge which the other stoutly denied. Both defendants gave evidence. One, who seemed to be the instigator or the more daring of the two, admitted the taking of the clothes, but averred that her intention was to return them on the following morning, which intention, she claimed, was upset by Sgt. Bradley's early appearance on the scene. The other girl, she said, accompanied her on the excursion on which she annexed the clothing. The second girl, however, while admitting that she had accompanied No. 1 and was told by her about the taking of the clothes, protested her innocence of complicity in the matter. His Honor found both equally guilty, one, he said, seemed to have more boldness and dexterity of fingers than the other; it was only, he thought, because she lacked these attributes that No. 2 did not take a more active part in the matter. Mr. McKinnon asked His Worship to exercise his clemency under the Criminal Code and give the defendants an opportunity of reform. His Worship acted on the suggestion, and suspended the sentences of the defendants, ordering them to sign bonds for their good behaviour during the period of the suspension. The girl who was foremost in the theft and who had been in trouble before, was not only made to sign a bond in the sum of \$100, but her father was also required to enter into a bond in a similar amount, making him responsible for his daughter's good behaviour for a year. For a similar term the sentence of the other girl was suspended, she alone being required to sign a bond of \$100 for her good behaviour.

The duck is beautifully mottled in black and white and is about the size of the common black duck. Taxidermist Calder is mounting the bird for Mr. Vanderstine.
