It is only when they have shared the horrors of war and when "Snapshot" herself is killed that the heartbroken Ulysses returns to his loyal wife with a reawakened consciousness of the responsibilities of his profession.

Gable offers what is undoubtedly the finest performance of his career as the self-satisfied surgeon, and Lana Turner rises to new heights as the tragic heroine who convinces him of the shallowness of his former life. Add to that the sensitive portrayal of Anne Baxter, as the wife who struggles to hold the man she knows to be in love with a memory, and that of John Hodiak, as Gable's pal who finally persuades him to devote his life to helping others, and you have a gallery of superb acting portrayals.


