## SCOTLAND'S ANNIVERSARY.

So large a portion of our Island population can trace their ancestry to Scotland that St. Andrew's Day has become one of the most popular and honored anniversaries of the year. In the Scot, the family and tribal relationship and attachment is only less strong than among the Hebrew people. Like the Jew he carries with him to the ends of the earth not only the memories and traditions of the land from which he sprung, but the insignia of the clan, or tribe to which his ancestors belonged. These constitute a double tie between the Scotman abroad and the land of his forefathers, which is probably stronger and more enduring than any other one of the European races.

From the strength of family attachments comes that characteristic of the Scottish people commonly spoken of as "clannish." With its strong attachment to the ancestral home and its associations. Dunvegan Castle in the Isle of Skye, has been in the continuous possession of the McLeod family for a thousand years, an incident without a parallel in Europe, and perhaps unequalled in the world. It is illustrative of one of many worthy features of Scottish character. Attachment to his clan, his race and his fatherland is stimulated and strengthened by national pride. His free northland has never worn the yoke of a conqueror. The tide of Roman conquest was rolled back before it reached his mountain strongholds. The armies of England struggled for long years with the fierce warriors of the north without effecting their subjugation. It ended in a peaceful union by which Scotland supplied a sovereign to the United Kingdom.

In the great work of Empire building that has since gone on Scotland has borne a noble part. In the conquest and acquisition of India, in the exploration of Africa and the development of the vigorous Commonwealth of Australia, Scottish names stand high on the imperial honor roll. It is but a fitting recognition of what Scotchman have achieved in the antipodean Colonies that the Earl of Hopetoun of the Scottish peerage is made the first Governor General of the new federation. We see about us how large a share Scotchmen and their descendants have had in the making of our great Dominion. The most eastern Province, because of its strong infusion of Scottish blood was called Nova Scotia—New Scotland. Scottish blood dominates Prince Edward Island as it has always dominated Ontario. It controls all the great enterprises that have their headquarters in Montreal. It built and controls our great trans-continental railway, the great Allan Line and other lines of Atlantic steamships and the splendid lines of steamships plying across the Pacific to Australia, China and Japan.

In creating, endowing and supporting our greater institutions of learning and our hospitals and charities Scottish names easily hold the first place for princely generosity. In framing the great fabric of Confederation they were the leading spirits; and in guiding its destinies the first leaders of our political parties were a Macdonald and a Mackenzie. When during the recent trouble in South Africa the loyal colonies were rallying to the support of the Empire it was a grand old Scottish Canadian who at his own personal cost contributed a regiment of horse to the Queen's service. This splendid incident of princely patriotism is without a parallel in the history of the century. If we add to all that Scotchmen and their descendants have done here and elsewhere in statesmanship, in Empire building, the splendid achievements of the race in arms in literature, in disseminating and exemplifying religious truth, we shall find substantial reasons why national pride should reinforce and strengthen the tie which binds Scotchmen, wherever they may be to the land from which they sprung, and prompt them to celebrate with hearty enthusiasm their national anniversary.

There is this to be said of national societies in Canada, whether English, Irish or Scotch, that by keeping alive the traditions and memories, and by recalling the glories of the lands of their fathers they distinctly strengthen the bond which binds together the great Empire of which we are so proud. No one of them is less a Canadian, less a good citizen of the Dominion or less proud of Canada from keeping warm within him the love for the old land wherein his forefathers lived and died. The annual re-unions in which our national societies celebrate the festivals of St. Andrew, St. George or St. Patrick are we think well worthy of perpetuation. They furnish opportunities which would

otherwise be wanting for interchange of thought and greetings of friendship upon an elevated plane. They tend to good fellowship and good citizenship and they stimulate a healthy patriotism.

It is not too much to say that in all that is best along these lines there is no national gathering in our midst that better fulfils its object than the annual festival of the Caledonian Club. The dinner of Thursday evening next at the Queen Hotel promises to be among the best and most enjoyable of a long series of these social reunions and ought to commend itself to Scotchmen throughout the City and the Island as an event of more than ordinary importance. It is not too much for them to give one night to Old Scotland in any year of a lifetime, but this year marks the close of a century and it seems fitting that the national festival should be honored with even more than ordinary spirit and enthusiasm.
