Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along the homestead line in each of three years. Must reside six months in each of a year from date of homestead entry, including the time required to earn homestead patent and, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house, worth \$200.00.

RUSSIAN AND CHINESE TROOPS IN CONFLICT

ST. PETERSBURG, March 8.—It is rumored in St. Petersburg that there has been a conflict between Russian and Chinese troops near Harbin, but no confirmation is possible. If the reports are true, the trouble probably arose from the situation following the efforts of the railroad authorities of Harbin to control the local administration.

A MISCHIEF MAKER

BERLIN, March 8.—A severe attack on Chancellor von Buelow and a defence of the Emperor William in connection with the alleged Imperial indiscretions of last year is contained in a book by Rudolf Martin, which will appear tomorrow. Herr Martin was formerly attached to the Department of the Interior, and he is said to have been supported by a considerable party at court as part of an organized plan to force von Buelow out of office.

Herr Martin gives expression to many sensational assertions against Prince von Buelow, whom he accuses of misdirecting the Emperor, especially in the matter of the interview published by the London "Daily Telegraph." He declares this interview was prepared under Prince von Buelow's instructions, and the Prince, after personal told His majesty it could be published. Then when the crisis arose after publication the Prince advised the Emperor to leave Berlin during the exciting debates in the Reichstag.

SUCCESSFUL FLIGHT IN FLYING MACHINE.

BADDECK, C. B., March 9.—Douglas McCurdy, yesterday, made five flights in the Silver Dart, the first four being experimental. In the fifth flight he remained in the air twelve minutes, covering a distance of 8 miles, flying over Baddeck, twice crossing the harbor, retaining absolute control and landing at the starting point with the utmost ease.

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY STREET CLEANER WAS ARRESTED

Foreign Missions and McKenzie Fund.—T. F. Fullerton, convener, Geo. E. Ross, and T. C. James, joint-treasurers, Geo. Miller, and J. W. McKenzie, Auditors; D. McKinnon and John McLaughlin, Mr. A. Craibe read the Presbytery Fund report as follows, which was received and adopted: Receipts \$181.27; expenditure \$97.10, balance on hand \$84.17.
Rev. C. McKinnon, Winnipeg, was nominated for the chair of Theology in the Presbyterian College, Halifax.
A circular on evangelism was read. After discussion it was decided that a committee be appointed, and a conference held on evangelism at an early date. Committee: Geo. E. Ross, Convener, Edwin Smith, A. B. McLeod, D. B. McLeod, R. G. Strathie, T. F. Fullerton, Geo. Miller, W. I. Green, ministers, John T. McKenzie, Charlottetown, J. J. McLeod, Riverdale, James Carruthers, N. Beique; A. Currie, Souris, Daniel McDonald, Hunter River, Wm. Brown, Margate, and Capt. McLaren, Georgetown, elders. A call from Lochiel, Ontario, in favor of Dr. McPhail, Mt. Stewart was presented and laid on the table. On motion the clerk was instructed to cite the session and congregation of Mt. Stewart to appear for their interests at a meeting of Presbytery to be held in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, 16th instant at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Reading of citation was left in the hands of Dr. McPhail.
The following were appointed commissioners to the General Assembly: by rotation, R. G. Strathie, A. Gray, A. B. McLeod; by election: Geo. Miller, and W. H. McIntosh, ministers, W. T. Huggan, Charlottetown, T. C. James, Charlottetown; C. H. S. Sterns, Souris; L. H. D. Foster, Marshfield, and H. McMillan, New Haven, elders.
The name of Mr. J. H. Hattie was submitted to the committee appointed to meet and consult with local members of the church at Miminogash in regard to church property there. It was moved, seconded and carried that the clerk be instructed to convey the sympathy of the Presbytery to Messrs S. D. McPhee, Belfast, and A. D. Sterling Kensington in their sickness, and express the hope that they may soon be in possession of health and strength and able to attend to life's duties. Presbytery then adjourned to meet in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday 16th instant, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., of which public intimation was made, and this sacred trust was closed with the benediction.
