IN MEMORIAM

DAVID H. HUME

At Providence R. I. on July 5th, 1925, after a short but distressing illness—Cancer-borne with heroic fortitude and calm resignation to the Divine will, the late David H. Hume in the 72nd year of his life.

Born at Bath, Me., he deceased in early life located in Brooklyn, P. E. I., but some time later he settled down at Peters Road where he greater part of his life was spent with his family on his farm there.

The late Mr. Hume was very popular with the majority of his acquaintances. He was a brilliant conversationalist, and his witty and humorous sayings brightened many a lonesome evening in the community where he resided. He was a keen and successful performer on the stage, and was frequently called upon to take a leading part in helpful community socials.

Perhaps slaying was his special forte, and whether in secular or religious form the sweet modulation of his voice still survive in our memory.

Of a kind and obliging disposition you had but to inform him where his services would be required, and he would invariably be present to help.

He took a special interest in church work during the last number of years and was generally present at the services (Church of Scotland) rendering also valuable services in the management of his own education eminently fitted him for such work.

During his illness in conversing with those attending him he gave evidence of a lively hope for the life beyond. By his request the 10th Psalm was sung at his funeral service.

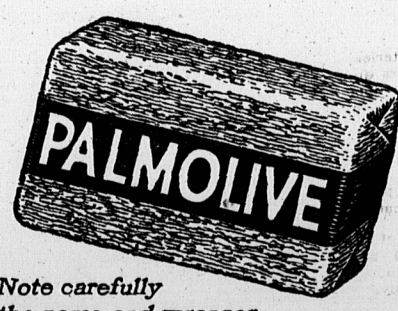
