League Assembly Hears Cheering Reports Of Times

NEWSPAPERS CRITICIZE BONCOUR

Paris Papers Fear Germany Is Given Too Many Concessions.

100 Are Believed Dead And 200 Injured In Battle

Soldiers And Snipers Exchange Gunfire Over Length And Breadth Of City.

(By John P. McKnight, Associated Press Staff Writer) HAVANA, Oct. 2—Bullets still spattered Havana's streets tonight as even the besieged officers in the National Hotel failed to bring peace after the bloodiest day in the city's history.

Carbon Monoxide Fumes From Furnace Sweep Through Alberta School.

EDMONTON, Oct. 2—(C.P.)—Twelve children are in hospital here and half-a-dozen are in their homes suffering from carbon monoxide gas poisoning caused when fumes from an improperly-adjusted furnace swept through the Grandin separate school here today and sent between 350 and 400 children scurrying to open air.

Jamaica Swept By Hurricane

Another tropical disturbance probably central about 200 miles north-northeast of Turks Island apparently moving north-northeastward with increasing intensity."

Bandits Make Getaway With \$20,000 In Brookline

(Associated Press) BROOKLINE, Mass., Oct. 2—In an obviously well-planned coup, six bandits entered the Washington Square branch of the Brookline Trust Company today, lined 20 clerks and customers against the walls, frustrated a policeman's interruption by disarming him and fled toward Boston in two automobiles after obtaining \$20,000.

Canadian Apples Flowing Into United Kingdom

OTTAWA, Oct. 2—Canadian apples are flowing into United Kingdom markets, according to cabled reports received by the Department of Agriculture. Large shipments from Nova Scotia, and smaller ones from Ontario and British Columbia, are reported. A recent shipment of Nova Scotia apples received at London totalled 31,464 barrels, while at the same time 4,988 boxes of British Columbia apples arrived. The Canadian fruit trade commissioner in London advised that there is a fair supply of boxed apples on United Kingdom markets, but barrels are light.

Destructive Fire In Ontario

MELBOURNE, Ont., Oct. 2—This village tonight counted the cost of its most destructive fire in years and made plans for immediate rebuilding of six structures destroyed today. A blaze which brought fire-fighters from Glencoe after it got beyond control of a bucket-brigade swept through the six buildings and also damaged several others. No cause of the fire has been determined. The damage was estimated at \$25,000.
