MARKET REVIEW

MCCOLL FRONTENAC

One of the reasons behind the recent strength in the shares of Superbest Petroleum Corporation is the belief in many quarters that negotiations have been in progress for control. The suggestion is heard that McColl Frontenac may be interested and this idea is strengthened by the denial by officials of British American Oil that the latter has submitted an offer. It is felt that a McColl Superbest merger would work out advantageously as it would give the larger company well developed distributive facilities especially in Western Ontario. The service station chains of the two companies are similar in type and would readily interlock. For the past fortnight reports have persisted in Toronto and Montreal that some new development of importance was under way for McColl whose stock has risen to around 28 1/2 while the two classes of Superbest shares have steadied around 41 1/2-2. Guesses are of a share exchange basis in a possible merger, each 1 of Superbest receiving 1 1/2 of McColl

DECLARATION OF NEW POWER DIVIDEND

One further step was carried out in connection with the new stock offering of Montreal Power and the split of 2 for 1 by the directors in declaring a quarterly dividend of 38

cents a share of the new stock, payable July 1st, to shareholders of record June 30th. This is at the rate of \$1.50 per share a year, equivalent to \$3 on the old stock in place of the former rate of \$2.40 per share, before the split. The current rates represent \$9 a share for those who held the stock before the 1926 split of 3 for 1 and a rate of \$27 a share for holders of the stock before a similar split made in 1916.

INTERNATIONAL HYDRO ELECTRIC

The quarterly statement of earnings of International Hydro-Electric System, whose A shares are listed on the Montreal Stock Exchange, reflects an increasing rate of earnings. Net available for dividends in the three months ended March 31st, 1929 amounted to \$1,107,076 equivalent to \$1.43 per share of A stock based on the average number of shares on which dividends were paid. This is equivalent to an annual rate of \$5.72 per share. Actual net for the full year ended March 31st, 1930, amounted to \$2,944,617 equivalent to \$4.73 per share of A stock on a similar basis. This indicates that the rate of earnings in the first quarter of 1930 was larger than for the full year ended March 31st.

It is interesting to note that the improvement would have been more substantial but for the fact that the earnings of Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation during the quarter were adversely affected by unusually low water conditions on the Gatineau River. Adequate protection has since been provided against recurrence of such conditions.

The A shares of International Hydro have become a fairly important market factor on the Montreal Stock Exchange in the past few weeks. Current level of around 46 is approximately eight times the indicated annual earning rate of \$5.72 per share. The company, which was formed in March 1929, for the purpose of grouping the principal power and utility assets controlled by International Paper, has among its subsidiaries some widely known utility companies, including Canadian Hydro-Electric Corporation, which in turn controls Gatineau Power Company, Gatineau Electric Light Company and St. John River Power Company.

FAMOUS PLAYERS

With the date for exchange of Famous Players Canadian Corporation shares for those of Paramount Players Lasky drawing near, attention is focused on the proposal. We believe that while the acceptance of this offer will give an immediate higher dividend in a stock with a broad market that the dominant position of the Canadian Company justifies the retention of the shares of Famous Players Canadian.

ALBERTA BEGINS STERILIZATION OF DEFECTIVES

LETHBRIDGE, May 21.—Eighteen to twenty mentally defective patients in Alberta have been sterilized under the Alberta Act for the Sterilization of Mental Defectives.
