

All Stars Hang 13-3 Defeat On Saints In Game At Summerside

In the first Charlottetown Hockey League fixture to be played in the Crystal Rink, Summerside, Windy Steele's All-Stars trounced St. Dunstan's University Saturday night by the top-sided score of 13-3. Before a near-capacity crowd of wildly cheering home supporters the McIver Steele squad showed a decided superiority over the red-shirted visitors in the last two periods, outscoring the college lads in the two frames 11 to one and 2-2.

The Saints suffered a severe blow to their chances of victory when with two minutes of play gone in the first period their ace forward-guardman, Hennessy, received a cut over his eye in a melee in front of the S.D.U. net and was forced to retire from the game. This left the Saints with only two defencemen for the remainder of the game.

Both goals, Strain and Fox turned in games that were considered creditably above average. DETROIT, Jan. 16 (AP)—The Detroit Red Wings scored three goals in the first 24 minutes tonight, then hung on to edge Montreal 3-2 and tighten their hold on the National Hockey League lead. A crowd of 14,352 saw the game.

When referee Jim Priceau, working his fourth National League game this season, failed to penalize Detroit goalie Harry Lumley late in the game for punching Montreal's Ken Reardon, the Canadiens held a sit-down conference in front of the bench and delayed the game approximately 10 minutes.

Priceau, who already had handed two Montreal players 10-minute misconduct penalties, assessed a two-minute penalty against the Habits for refusing to start the game and they reluctantly finished the game.

Detroit scored twice in the opening period, when Leo Reise knocked in Jim Elio's rebound off a goal post as Ted Lindsay rifled a low shot past Bill Duran.

Bill Quackenbush's angle shot off Sid Abel's pass hoisted Detroit's lead to 3-0 early in the second period before Montreal got both its counters in minutes apart.
