HINTS FOR The Motorist

COLD WEATHER GEAR LUBRICATION

Grease That Does Not Reach The Parts is Useless

In connection with the recently discussed subject of "splash lubrication," it is well to realize that this method is altogether the most important one in automobile practice and is employed in the lubrication of all the parts of the change speed gear (transmission), and in that of the transmission parts, located at the rear axle. Often it is applied to clutch parts as well and in general, wherever a collection of moving parts is enclosed in a tight housing. In the gear case lubrication is required at the following points: The faces of the gears so that they may run together quietly and with little wear, and also mesh together easily; the slides upon which the gears are moved in shifting, as well as their locking devices, in order to facilitate speed changing speeds; the surfaces of the high speed, direct-drive clutch; the pilot bearing between the engine-driven gear shaft and the final-drive shaft; the stud on which the reverse idler gear runs and the ball or rolling bearings that support of the gear shafts. In the rear-axle housing, there are the drive and differential gear faces; the inboard axle-shaft bearings (including thrust bearings); the radial and thrust bearings of the pinion-shaft and the studs that carry the differential pinions. The principle relied upon for the lubrication of both these important elements is as follows: Sufficient lubricant is placed in the housing so that on a normal large gear constantly dip in it and carry it up as they turn, dropping it on the shafts, along which it works into the bearings, slides and other parts or at high speed, filling the housing, fully with flying lubricant, which settles upon and distributes over all working parts. This method works out very well, so long as the lubricant is fluid or semi-fluid, but fails disastrously if the lubricant becomes too thick to do so in winter. On most transmissions and axle housings there is a drain or oil-level plug, which can be removed. When this is taken out, if no lubricant escapes through it, either the supply is insufficient or the oil is stiff and thin oil should be added until when mixing has taken place, grease will flow through the hole fairly freely.

SHIPPING NEWS

ROYAL GEORGE HAS STORMY PASSAGE
Coated with ice the steamer Royal George, of the Cunard fleet, under command of Captain W. P. Brodie, steamed into Halifax Harbor shortly after five o'clock Tuesday afternoon, thus completing a twelve day trip from Southampton. On board were about one hundred passengers to land at Halifax and after taking on several hundred tons of mail, the steamer left for New York.

The passage from Southampton was a stormy one, and delayed the steamer several days. Heavy weather, which is expected at this season of the year, was encountered all the way across the Atlantic, but the steamer came through safely. Off the Atlantic coast, the weather was very stormy.

STAR LINER BARDIC DISABLED
While engaged in the work of assisting the Powhattan, the White Star liner Bardic has herself been disabled, and is now heading for Halifax on her starboard engine.

The passenger steamer Northern Pacific has arrived at the Powhattan's position, as well as a fleet of United States destroyers, and they will endeavor to rescue the passengers at the first opportunity. The steamer Western Comet is still standing by, and will likely attempt to take the Powhattan in tow, while the Dominion Government steamer Lady Laurier has also arrived on the scene.

CANADIAN SEALER TO REMAIN IN SOURS
The Canadian sealer now at Souris which accompanied by the Montcalm, was to have proceeded to the Magdalen Islands has received orders to lay up for the winter in that port.

The Montcalm will take off the passengers and mail, and proceed to the Magdalen Islands as soon as weather conditions permit.

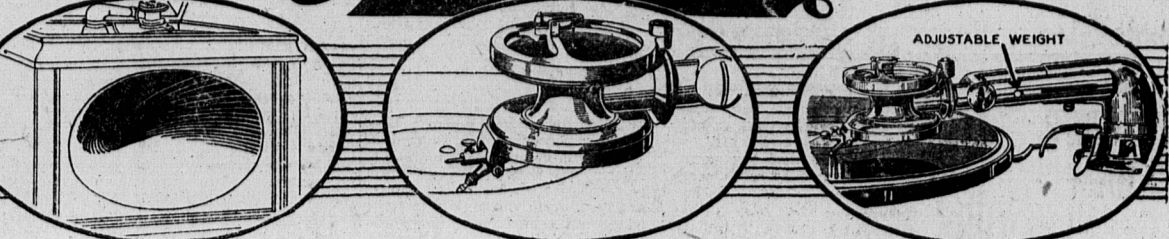
