Changes In Management Of C.N.R. Hotels

(Special to the Guardian)

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 11.—Changes in the management of three Canadian National Railway Hotels, were announced today by Walter Pratt, general manager of hotels, sleeping and dining cars for the national system. H. W. Aslin, hitherto manager of the Nova Scotian Hotel at Halifax, is promoted to the management of the MacDonald Hotel at Edmonton. Mr. Aslin will leave for Edmonton shortly. Charles L. Weldon, hitherto manager of the Fort Garry Hotel at Winnipeg, will succeed Mr. Aslin as manager of the Nova Scotian and has left for Halifax to assume his new duties. Mr. Weldon is being succeeded at Winnipeg by H. H. Tillman, who comes from the MacDonald at Edmonton to take over the Fort Garry.

H. W. Aslin has been with the Canadian National Hotels since 1928. During that year he served as acting manager and later manager of the Prince Arthur Hotel at Port Arthur and was transferred to the Nova Scotian at Halifax on the opening of that hotel in 1930.

C. L. Weldon, a native of Montreal, who entered the hotel business at Toronto on his return from war service in France. He served successively with the King Edward at Toronto, Mount Royal, Montreal, Benjamin Franklin, Philadelphia and Book Cadillac at Detroit as assistant manager in each case and from 1926 served as assistant manager of the Chateau Laurier, Jasper Park Lodge and Fort Garry Hotels, as assistant manager. Was appointed manager of the MacDonald at Edmonton in 1927 and later was transferred as manager of the Fort Garry at Winnipeg.

Howard H. Tillman first joined Canadian National Hotels at Edmonton in 1915 as chief clerk. He served subsequently at the Fort Garry in Winnipeg as room clerk and became assistant manager of the Chateau Laurier at Ottawa in 1926. In 1929, Mr. Tillman managed Pictou Lodge at Pictou and in 1930 went first to the Prince Arthur Hotel at Port Arthur and later in the same year to the MacDonald Hotel at Edmonton as manager in each case.

N. B. Has Large Potato Surplus

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 11.—Approximately one half of last fall's certified seed potato production in New Brunswick has been sold to date by the growers, leaving a balance of some 350,000 bushels made up largely of green mountains and Irish cobbler, according to C. H. Goodwin, of the Dominion Seed Potato Inspection Service.

The general opinion among potato experts is that the growers will not be able to dispose of all the remainder of their seed as such, and that a good deal of it will go for table stock by spring. Bliss triumph stock, grown chiefly for the Cuban market, is now about cleaned up, and the stock of seed on hand consists largely of mountains and cobbler, either of which variety is a good table potato here.

Due principally to the decrease in the purchasing power of many buyers who heretofore took large stock of seed, the demand this winter for New Brunswick seed has not been heavy, and this has accounted for low prices. The current figure is \$1 per barrel to the growers, as against anywhere from 75 to 90 cents for table potatoes. In normal times, seed potatoes bring about twice as much as table stock. The small difference in prices for the two classes will be a factor in the decision of producers to sell surplus seed for table use. It is believed here.

Late last month two steamer loads of bliss triumphs grown in the province left Saint John by way of the province for the Cuban market, marking the winding up of the season's exports to that country. Cuban shipments showed a falling off of about twenty-five per cent from last year. Shipping to the United States is not expected to be underway substantially until March.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—(C.P.)—The King is greatly interested in the beautifully colored little birds known as budgerigars (Australian Love Birds). This was mentioned at the festival of the Royal Hospital and Home for the Curables at Putney.

During the King's visit to the Home a few months ago a woman patient showed her collection to him, and was pleased to learn from the King that he had several—red, green and blue—and that he thought a lot of them. When told by the patient that she did not breed them, the King remarked that she was denied the pleasure of looking after the little ones, which were specially interesting.
