## By-Law Compelling The Removal Of Snow And Ice From Off The Side-Walks.

Attention of householders is called to the following extract from the City by-laws.

"It shall be the duty of every tenant or occupier of any premises in the City, or in case there be no tenant, then of the owner of such premises, to keep such portion of any public walk as shall be immediately in front of such premises free from snow at all times except that it shall be sufficient to have the same free from snow four hours after the ceasing of any snow storm, if such ceases in the daytime, or if in the night time then before ten o'clock in the day time following; and further to keep such portion of public walk free from ice at all reasonable times, otherwise to cover the same with sand, ashes or other materials sufficient to give safe footing."

"no power or combination of powers of this earth" shall shake their hold upon their fundamental guarantees of liberty.

"The issue of our time" he said "is the issue of the war in which we are engaged, is the issue forced upon the decent, self-respecting peoples of the earth by the aggressive dogmas of this attempted revival of barbarism. This effort to impose again upon the peoples of the world doctrines of absolute obedience, and of dictatorial rule, and of the suppression of truth, and of the oppression of conscience, which the free nations of the earth have long ago rejected.

"What we face is nothing more or less than an attempt to overthrow and to cancel out the upsurge of human liberty of which the American Bill of Rights is the fundamental document; to force the peoples of the earth, and among them the peoples of this continent, to accept again the rule of absolute authority and despotic rule from which the courage and the resolution and the sacrifices of many, many years have liberated them.

This attempt could succeed, the President declared firmly, only if those who inherited the gift of liberty "had lost the manhood to preserve it."

The determination of this generation to preserve liberty, he declared, is as fixed and certain as that of an earlier generation of Americans to win it.

"We covenant with each other before all the world," Mr. Roosevelt declared, "that having taken up arms in the defence of liberty, we will not lay them down before liberty is once again secure in the world we live in; for that security we pray; for that security we act—now and forever more."

most perfect example the war has seen—of agents giving detailed and exact information on defences, military routine and disposition of defending forces.

5. There were from 150 to 300 planes in the attacking force which hit the peaceful island just at sundown and before the usual military patrol returned to its base. They operated from aircraft carriers which were never spotted.

6. The harbor, dyocks and oil storage depots were undamaged but there was "severe damage in aircraft and some hangars" operated by the army.

7. The main purpose of the Japanese was to knock out the main Pacific fleet but in this they failed conspicuously.

As an indication of the lack of alertness on the part of the United States army and navy, Knox revealed that at least one submarine was first inside the harbor and the first indication that Japanese planes were approaching came from a man in the signal tower who used glasses to detect them.

Surrounded by high-ranking naval officers, the Secretary disclosed details of one of the most audacious attacks in the history of warfare, an attack planned for many weeks.

With the true instinct of a newspaperman—he is the publisher of the Chicago Daily News—Knox returned with many stories of heroism, bravery and coolness under fire.

He expatiated the high morale that exists today in Hawaii, which used to be described as the paradise of the Pacific, and when a newspaperman challenged him to repeat what the men of the army and navy were saying he burst out that "everywhere he heard them say: 'we wish the Japs would come back'."

Even since the Japanese raid on Pearl Harbor, the main Pacific base for the American fleet, a raid that preceded by several hours Japan's declaration of war against the United States and Britain, there have been rumors in Washington of irreparable damage to the navy. At one time the rumors credited the Japanese with sinking eight battleships and more than one aircraft carrier.

But Knox's statement scotched these reports and, among other things, disclosed there were no aircraft carriers in port that quiet Sunday morning.

### Expect drastic Cut in motor Car production

OTTAWA, Dec. 15 (CP)—Prohibition of passenger automobile manufacture except for the most essential purposes is unofficially reported to be under consideration by the government, along with other measures designed to conserve Canada's full industrial and material resources into the war effort.

Reports are current in Ottawa that the great motor manufacturers in the United States are also considering a virtual stoppage in pleasure car manufacture so their plants may go into aircraft and other forms of war production.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King and his cabinet colleagues, deluged with recommendations from private sources and in newspaper editorials, offering advice on steps that should be taken for an all out war effort, are preparing new programs involving greater sacrifices by the general public.

ack," and announced that Mr. Roosevelt would make a formal invitation to the British to join the attack began, however, the defence was conducted "skillfully and bravely," he said. Proudly he cited many instances of heroism including that of a dying captain of a battleship whose stomach was laid open by shrapnel fire but who refused to be carried to safety and continued to direct his men from a bridge which had become a blazing inferno.

Knox's report brought a sense of relief to members of Congress steeled for much worse news and hanging down in the task of enacting far-reaching war legislation.

Congressional action included: The House of Representatives quickly approved of a \$10,000,000 "loan guarantee" bill.

The House Military Committee approved legislation to register all men aged 18 to 64, inclusive, and to make those 21 to 44, inclusive, liable for military service. A war department plan to make 19 and 20-year old youths available for combatant duty was turned down.

The House Naval Committee approved a bill authorizing 150,000 tons of new construction in addition to the two-ocean navy already building.

News from the Pacific fighting was, on the whole, cheerful. Their first invasion forces shattered and driven off except at three widely-scattered points, the Japanese appeared to be carrying out only desultory operations against the Philippines, for the time being.

And the garrisons at Wake and Midway Islands still were holding out.

This was revealed late today by a navy communique which also said critically that a Norwegian motorship plan to sink 19 ships approaching the Hawaiian Islands. What the motorship's purpose was or how she was sunk was not disclosed.

An early afternoon war department communique said enemy air operations in the Philippines were being continuing as were ground operations in the north and northwest sections of Luzon and in the vicinity of Legaspi in southeastern Luzon.

As for other areas, the department said "there is nothing to report."

But major campaigns were under way against the British strongholds in the China Sea—Hong Kong and Singapore. Mechanized Japanese forces were pushing southward from Thailand toward Singapore and were said by the British command to have gained ground in recent fighting.

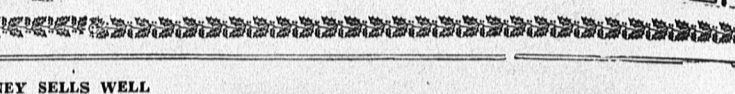

### HONEY SELLS WELL

It is expected that the Canadian 1941 honey crop, estimated at 27,000,000 pounds, will be readily disposed of at good prices. The average returns for the three previous years have been 7.8 cents per pound in 1938; 8.7 cents in 1939; 10.2 cents in 1940, and it is estimated that the average price for 1941 will be 10.7 cents per pound.

Annual exports of honey to the United Kingdom have more than doubled since war was declared. During the fiscal year 1939-40, the imports of honey were controlled by the British Ministry, exports from Canada jumped from a little more than 1,000,000 tons per annum (2,300,000 per ton) to nearly 4,000 tons. In 1940 exports to Britain were controlled and a quota of 2,000 long tons at a maximum price of 65 shillings per cwt., was allotted to Canada. A similar quota prevails for the year ending August 30, 1942. In 1938, honey production in Canada amounted to 37,000,970 pounds; in 1939, 28,875,100 pounds; in 1940, 23,873,100 pounds, and in 1940 an estimate of 27,000,000 pounds.
