United Church of Canada Expected to Occur Before 1925 WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 13—Actual organic union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches will take place before 1925, President J. H. Riddell of Wesley College, predicted here yesterday. Legislation authorizing the creation of the United Church of Canada, a fusion of the three bodies, he said, will be brought down at the forthcoming session of parliament. Dr. S. D. Chown, of Toronto, general superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, will outline problems connected with the proposed union at a meeting in Wesley College next Friday night.

IN MEMORIAM MR. WILBERT J. MACINTYRE The death took place in the City Hospital, Charlottetown on Nov. 24th, 1921 of Wilbert J. MacIntyre son of Joseph MacIntyre of Traveller's Rest. Death was due to typhoid fever, which disease he contracted while doing duty as attendant at Falconwood Hospital. Wilbert had a kind and genial disposition, well liked by all who knew him and deservedly popular with his associates. All that medical aid and loving care could do was done, but God willed otherwise and he died fortified by all the last rites of Holy Mother Church at the early age of twenty-seven years. He is survived by a sorrowing father, two sisters, Mrs. James V. McDonald of Borden and Mrs. C. Leo Coyle of Lynn, Mass., and one brother, J. ADDRESS OF PRESENTATION Mrs. Angus Beaton, formerly of Brookfield, P.E.I., now of Lunenburg, Alberta, was recipient of the following letter of appreciation from her former friends: Mrs. Angus Beaton, Brookfield, P.E.I., Dear Mrs. Beaton: During the past few months it has, from time to time been rumored, that you and your family intended leaving our community and taking up your abode in the midst of new surroundings. We had hoped that such rumor was not true, but recently we have come to realize that it is all too true, and your family are really leaving us, and your very near future. And now, lest we might not have another opportunity, we have assembled here this evening to tell you how much we shall miss you all. For long years you and your highly esteemed husband, up until the very close of his life, took a deep interest in the welfare of our country-side. We miss him sorely in the Sunday School and in all departments of a Christian's work, and now we shall feel keenly your loss. Prince of Wales Wins All Ranks by His Courtesy LONDON, Dec. 7.—According to a Reuter cable from Bikanair, the Prince of Wales, who today said "good-bye" to that state, achieved wonderful popularity there, largely attributable, according to a court official, to his gracious courtesy. The natives of Bikanair invariably salute persons of high rank three successive times and Europeans commonly respond only once. The fact that the Prince never fails to return each salutation has made a profound impression on the people, with whom such apparent trifles count far more than is generally realized. Great Enthusiasm. BHARATPUR, British India, Dec. 8.—The Prince of Wales, who is continuing his hunting trip through Rajputan, arrived here today. The Prince was received with the same spectacular scenes of Indian military pomp as he has witnessed at previous stopping places. The natives of Bharatpur are showing great enthusiasm over his visit. Denounces Disturbers. RANGOON, Burma, Dec. 7.—Speaking in the Legislature today, Lieut.-Gov. R. H. Craddock condemned the efforts of what he termed a "dissatisfied clique" to organize a boycott on the occasion of the visit of the Prince of Wales by means of intimidation. The Lieutenant-Governor announced that in order to prevent a recurrence of the violence which occurred during the stay of the Prince in Bombay, it had been decided to intern the leaders of the movement here. He expressed confidence that a majority of the Burmans would welcome the Prince as cordially as he had been welcomed in other communities. Arrest Leaders. DELHI, India, Dec. 7.—Twelve leaders of the Non-Co-operationist movement have been arrested at Allahabad and Lucknow, charged with attempting to address meetings for the enrollment of recruits in the national volunteers. The Magistrate at Lucknow has issued orders prohibiting such meetings for two months.
