ADAM'S APPLE.

This discourse is for men only. "Adam's apple" as it is called is the enlargement of the throat of the adult man in the region of the collar button. Inside of this curious deformity are the larynx, the vocal cords, the organs of vocal music, curiously wrought. Women have no Adam's Apple, nor have young boys. As the youth grows to manhood the gristly framework of the larynx enlarges, the vocal cords lengthen, and as we know, the longer strings of the piano vibrate more slowly than the shorter strings and so produce a lower note; so with the lengthening of the vocal cords and the growth of Adam's Apple the voice of the youth drops an octave and takes permanently a lower register. All nations have the fable that when Adam took the forbidden fruit at the hand of Eve and ate it he did so with full consciousness of the consequences and greatly feared as he ate. A part of the fruit stuck in his throat and caused a swelling, a permanent deformity, which by the law of heredity has been entailed on all his masculine descendants. We all have this blemish on the form, a form that was made in the divine image; a blemish note in the voice with which we ought to hold converse with Heaven. With Eve things were somewhat different. She foolishly believed the serpent, the voice from below contradicting the voice from above. After she had eaten the fruit we do not read that she was immediately conscious of the gravity of what she had done, or sorry, or ashamed. That came later. The apple did not stick in her throat, although she probably ate it all up, and gave Adam another from the same tree. Which things are an allegory. Some persons not otherwise have speculated much as to the nature of the forbidden fruit of Paradise. What was it that Adam and Eve, in the prime of youthful manhood and womanhood were forbidden to touch or to taste under such awful penalty? Was it an actual fruit like an apple? No. Tree of knowledge and tree of life are clearly symbolical terms. Pertained it to their relations with each other exclusively? We think not. It clearly was some supreme test of the obedience to the voice divine. It was a symbol of the deadly temptations

which in its active form have since come to all their adult descendants. There is more forbidden fruit outside of Eden than ever there was within its gates. To every man, many times, in various forms, comes the temptation to taste forbidden fruit. We are each as much on probation as Adam was.

If we yield to the voice from below and taste forbidden fruit it will stick in the throat. It will cause moral, and perhaps physical deformity. The blemish may be transmitted to our children. The law of heredity is as much in vogue now as it was in the days of Adam. The moral nature may be scarred by a fall, or it may be utterly broken, as a man's back may be broken by a fall from a great height. What can recover a man whose moral backbone is broken?

This is not preaching. It is common sense; it is common human experience. The man who stood erect and noble, receiving his Creator's benediction as the lord of the new world, and by a single act became a slinking coward, seeking cover for his shame and dishonor, is a type of millions of the race who have in like manner fallen by partaking of forbidden fruit. The lump in the throat is but one of many marks of disobedience to the higher law. Every man has some scars upon his moral nature even if none appear outwardly. There is a record within if not without, and no man can afford to keep perpetual company with an uncomfortable secret. There may be deep degradation under a very respectable exterior. Think of these things, reader, when you stand before the glass to shave yours and find Adam's Apple in the way of your razor.
