EGGS AND POULTRY - A greater decline in egg receipts is apparent this week, more so than at any time this season. Prices are now in most instances at ceiling levels. Demand is brisk from all Maritime points with grading stations unable to fill requirements. Grading stations are paying for ungraded receipts: AL 46-7; AM 43-4; AP 35-42; B 35-40; C 30. Dealers quoting for graded receipts AL 49 1-2; AM 47 1-2; AP 40-3; B 43; C 35. Dressed poultry receipts are increasing very considerably and indications are that a slight reduction may occur in prices. Registered poultry stations at Charlottetown are quoting for dressed poultry A Milkfed 30; B Milkfed 28; B 26; C 20. Fowl grade A 21; B 21; C 18.
