**Service Men Aid At Boston Fire**



Navy and Coast Guard seamen and soldiers assist in removing some of the hundreds of dead and injured from the fire-ravaged Coconut Grove night club in Boston after one of the most frightful disasters in the nation's history. Over 400 were reported killed and scores were injured.

**Scout News and Notices**

Boy Scouts at Prestwich, England, acted as casualties and messengers in an all-night invasion exercise by Home Guard units.

Taking the money they had saved toward the operation of their summer camp next year, Scouts of the 14th Toronto (Gwawasa) Troop purchased a \$100 Victory Bond.

Boy Scout Herbert S. Ermann, aged 16, a refugee from Germany and now a member of a British Boy Scout Troop, has been awarded the Scout Certificate of Gallantry for fire-fighting during an enemy raid. An officer of the local Fire Brig reported the boy's work as reflecting great credit on his training as a Scout.

Boy Scouts of the 5th Whitley Troop, England, returned from their summer camp to find their town had been bombed. The boys went right to work cleaning up the town, helping bombed people remove their furniture, and making tea for a group of P. workers. Another group went to work as assistants at the local Hospital.

When Boy Scout Bob Kemp of the 24th Legion Troop, Hamilton, studied the use of the tourniquet at his Scout meeting one night, he hardly expected to have his knowledge tested so quickly. The next night he was at the scene of an automobile accident and by the application of a tourniquet was able to prevent a serious loss of blood from one of the victims who happened to be a former Scout leader.

Boy Scouts of the 14th Edinburgh Troop had a record of 23,000 hours of international service during the past year. In addition to regular messenger and salvage services they have included Home Guard and Zoo policing duties.

Boy Scouts of a Reading, England, Troop have adopted a nearby day nursery. No, they don't mind the babies, but they do keep in constant repair a nursery toy.

"The question of youth movements is today very much in the air," but Lord Baden-Powell solved the problem many years ago by founding the Boy Scouts, the greatest work any individual has done anywhere in the past hundred years," Lord Aiklen.

A dozen Boy Scouts of St. Catharines acted as guinea pigs at the St. Catharines General Hospital when they were "patients" for a whole day as nurses demonstrated a new method in the treatment of infantile paralysis.

Boy Scouts of the 1st Narrabri Troop in Australia, besides making regular salvage collections with their own truck cart, also collected books and magazines for the services library, donated \$50 to the hospital club, and are to present a bed for a child's ward in a new hospital under construction.

Boy Scouts of Amherst, N. S. are not only doing their bit in war service but have invested \$100 in the Third Victory Loan. The boys from this Troop have a big stake in this war with no less than 30 former members serving with Canada's armed forces. When the boys required a leader, the principal of the Central Junior High School volunteered his services.

Writing to Imperial Headquarters of the Boy Scouts in London, Corporal House, former Scoutmaster of the 145th Toronto Group, had this to say: "Since my last call at
