THE MARKETS
 MONTREAL, Feb. 22. - The demand from the United Kingdom and the continent for Canadian grain here today showed a decided improvement and a larger volume of business was done in wheat and oats for nearby shipment. A feature of the local cash grain market was the demand that developed from New York exporters for Manitoba wheat sales of No. 4 grades were made at 14 1-2 cents per bushel under the Winnipeg May option. C. I. F. bay ports now at West Saint John. There was also a steady demand from local buyers for oats and quite a few cars were sold for rail shipment from Fort William.
 The market for coarse grains were firm with moderate trade passing. Owing to the continued strength in the Winnipeg wheat situation, a stronger feeling developed in the market values were marked up ten cents for spring grades of flour here and values were marked up ten cents per barrel. Another feature of the trade was the increased demand from foreign buyers and a fair volume of business was accomplished including sales for May shipment. An active trade was also done in winter wheat flour and prices were steady. Considerable business was again transacted in all lines of millfeed and the undertone was firm. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was somewhat limited but prices were unchanged. The undertone to the market for fresh eggs was firm under a good demand. The trade in storage eggs was quiet. The receipts were 513 cases.
