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FOX DIVIDEND.—The Eureka Fox Co., Ltd., has earned a dividend of 175 per cent on the year's working. On the recommendation of the Directors, new stock to this value has been issued to the shareholders.

ORWELL.—Rev. Malcolm James McLeod, D. D., New York City, will preach in St. Andrew's Church, Orwell, next Sabbath at 3 o'clock. There will be no service in Orwell Head Church.

NAME CORRECTED.—In Ayshire cattle Messrs. McRae & Sons (not McBeath), Charlottetown, won twelve prizes, seven firsts, four seconds and one third at the Halifax Exhibition. This firm also won one second prize in pigs. All these winnings will be exhibited at the Fredrickton Exhibition and leave for Fredrickton on Sept. 11th.

DREDGING.—Captain J. N. McDonald, Inspector of Dredges has returned from the Magdalen Islands where he has been for the past week inspecting the dredging being done there. Capt. McDonald reports that Dredge No. 4 is doing grand work in the harbor of Grand Entry. The people of the Magdalen Islands seem very much pleased that the Government is having their work attended to, for it was greatly needed. Capt. McDonald reports that the crops this year in the Magdalen Islands are exceptionally good, and with the excellent prices prevailing the islanders are jubilant. An extension of the lobster season in the Island of one month opened on September 1st and splendid hauls are being made.

QUEEN'S-COUNTY FOX ASSOCIATION.—A meeting of Queen's County Silver Back Fox Association was held in the Dalton Fox Co's office yesterday afternoon. The President Dr. Ross in the chair. The chairman explained that since last meeting, when the association was instituted, there had been certain developments; the P. E. Island Association which had been moribund has assumed activity, and it was just a question whether they considered that association, under its new auspices, would accomplish everything necessary for the protection and development of the fox industry. If the answer was in the affirmative then there was no use for two associations, and that for Queen's County could be dissolved. Mr. W. B. Prowse said the original objection to the P. E. I. Association was that it was located in Prince County. Now most of the officers and officials were in Charlottetown, and he thought that removed the principle objection to it. Mr. J. Webster said that it was the action of Queen's County that stirred up the P. E. I. Association, and it might be advisable to keep it alive till they saw what the other was going actually to do. A member who could join the local association might not be prepared to become a member of the P. E. I. Association. On the motion of Mr. McKendrick, seconded by Mr. Roy Holman, it was agreed not to dissolve the association, but to continue it in existence until such time as it was certain the P. E. I. Association would become properly organized with a constitution that would meet the approval of Queen's County fox men. It was left to the executive to take further action when necessary.

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BURIED YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late Veronica Morgan, took place yesterday morning to the Pro-Cathedral, and was largely attended. The services at the Church were conducted by Rev. Father McQuaid, assisted by Father Jerome of Quebec and Father Plus at the grave. The following were the pallbearers:—E. McCarry, Alban McDonald, Egbert Hughes, Joseph Hennessey, Patrick McQuaid and Edward Dudy.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—In a recent letter from Gibson N. B. an accident is reported which might have resulted in very serious consequence. Rev. Chas. Flemington, a Methodist minister who has frequently visited this Island, was driving, with his young daughter, across the bridge which spans the river between Gibson and Fredericton. When about in the middle of the bridge an automobile, coming up behind, ran into the buggy, and the horse taking fright became unmanageable. In the frantic efforts to get away it broke the harness. Mr. Flemington displayed great presence of mind and held on to the reins, through he was dragged right over the dash-board. Fortunately both he and his daughter escaped with nothing worse than a severe shaking and some nasty cuts and bruises.

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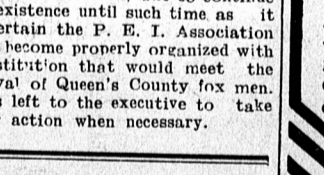
