half a million people attend weekly temperance lectures, and as a result, the Duma commission, which has had under consideration the drink question in that country, has reported in favor of replacing the imperial eagle on the labels of vodka bottles by the skull and cross-bones; and the recent International Congress on Alcoholism, in London, 1,500 delegates were in attendance from 26 countries, the largest number (150) being from Germany, whose present Chancellor sent hearty greetings; a prominent field marshal of the Imperial Army, a distinguished Admiral, the Lord Chief Justice, and the Prime Minister - to mention only British names - made earnest and impressive addresses.

Time and space fail to permit further enumeration of what is being accomplished along temperance lines. We may well sing in joyful hope the optimistic lines: - "A loftier race Than e'er the world hath known shall rise, With flame of freedom in their souls And light of knowledge in their eyes."

As Prince Edward Islanders we are proud of the advanced step we have been able to take in securing Prohibition. We appreciate its blessings and advantages and shall stand by it manfully. The whole civilized world is after that to which we have at-

tained, and we are not uninterested spectators of this great moral conflict. Many states across the border, both North and South, have become dry, and are enjoying the benefits of Prohibition. You will, we trust, see around you, as you visit the different parts of this province, evidence of thrift, comfort, and content, as well as evidence of a moral, law-abiding people. These things are, we believe, to a considerable extent, owing to the temperance principles of our citizens.

We welcome you because of what you are yourself, and because of the great work in which you are engaged. We sincerely hope that your visit to our province may be a pleasant one to you, as we have no doubt it will be profitable to us; and it is our earnest wish that the pleasant memories we shall cherish of this visit may be mutually shared by yourself.

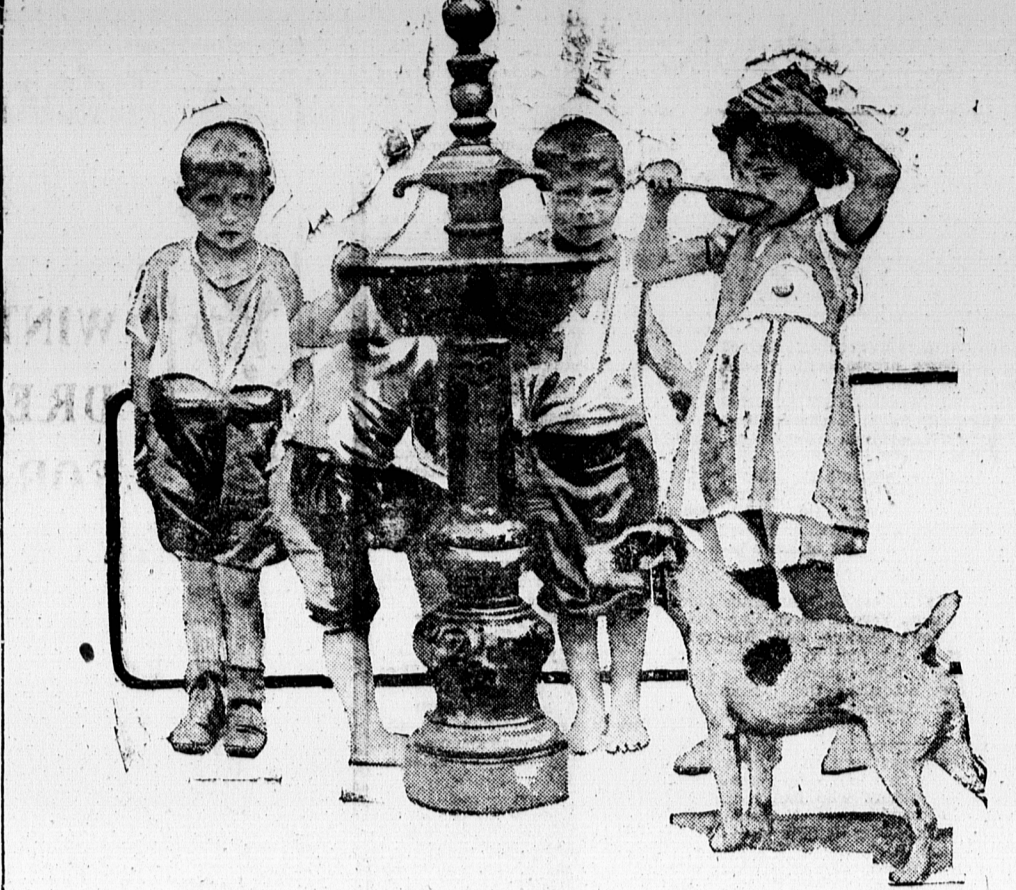

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.-Another chapter has been added to the remarkable career of Broughton Brandenburg, magazine writer and adventurer, by the second disappearance from this city of his little stepson, Jas. Shepard Cabanne III. Brandenburg already stands accused of kidnaping the child once and taking him to San Francisco. It was there he was arrested on a charge of selling a forged interview with the late Grover Cleveland.
Jas. Shepard Cabanne, father of the child, has left St. Louis also. His whereabouts are concealed by members of the aristocratic Cabanne family, the oldest west of the Mississippi.
Brandenburg married Mrs. Cabanne after a divorce sensation. The boy vanished, was brought back by officers, then vanished again. The second time the family feared a kidnaping was holding him for ransom. A man was seen talking with the boy near his home, on Cabanne-av., and this man was supposed to be a member of the black hand.
Now the child's mother and Brandenburg are believed to hold the secret of the boy's present whereabouts.
