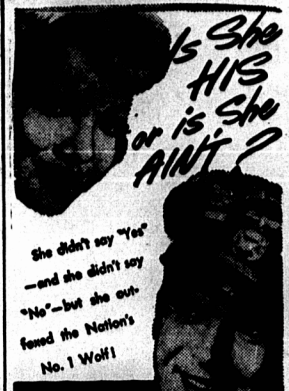

Annual Exhibition Held At Alberton Yesterday

The nineteenth annual exhibition of the Alberton Prince County Exhibition Association was held yesterday with the biggest crowd in the history of the fair in attendance. Between twenty-five hundred and three thousand people thronged the grounds and although the weather was threatening no rain fell during the afternoon to mar the proceedings.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor J.A. Bernard formally opened the exhibition and congratulated the Association on the progress made during the year. Also on the platform were Mayor Robert Hardie, Brookline and Mr. A.D. O'Brien, president of the Association, who gave short addresses.

The livestock exhibits in general were up, both in quantity and quality, over last year. The roots, vegetables and fruit exhibits were considerably down over last year, due to the drought, but what were shown were of good quality. The cattle were decidedly better quality than formerly.

HALIFAX, Sept. 12 - (CP) - Oscar Gallant, wounded war veteran and native of Piusville, P.E.I., received a severe shock at the controls of his tractor here yesterday, but reported tonight he was feeling fine.

The veteran, who joined the tram company in Charlottetown when he was returned from overseas two months ago, was severely shocked while turning on a live wire or switch control on the tram.

He was taken to a nearby store and was revived and taken to hospital. His injuries were found to be not extensive, and he was not harmed by the current except for minor burns on his hand and shock.

Destroyer Micmac Is Commissioned

HALIFAX, Sept. 12 - (CP) - The first Canadian-built Tribal Class destroyer - H.M.C.S. Micmac - today joined her sister ships and the Royal Canadian Navy in a brief commissioning ceremony here.

The commissioning was conducted by Hon. L. E. Flanagan, R.C.N. assistant commandant, acting captain, on the quarterdeck of the sleek destroyer that sailed today for Halifax shipyards two days ago this month.

On the quarterdeck too were Commodore C.R.H. Taylor, C.B.E., R.C.N. commanding officer, Atlantic coast, and other naval officers including Micmac's commanding officer, Lt. Cmdr. R.L. Hennessy, D.S.C., R.C.N., of Ottawa.

The event marked the official transfer of Micmac from her builders to the Navy. Friday she will put to sea for the first time flying the White Ensign for her final acceptance trials before going into operational scheduled service.

Her future operations will be have not been announced. Before the Japanese surrendered she was being prepared on the coast for service in Pacific waters with other Canadian naval units.

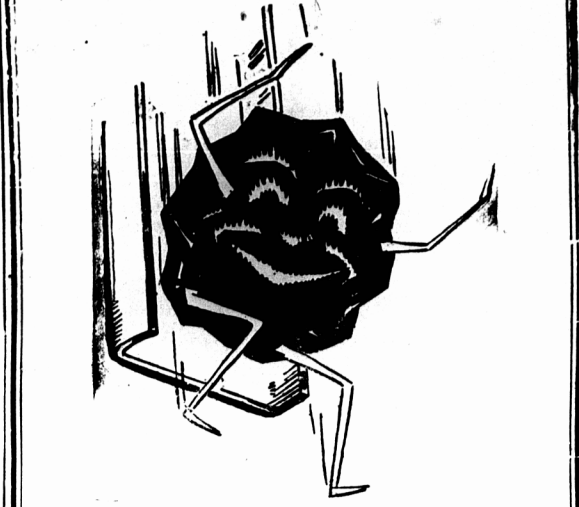
