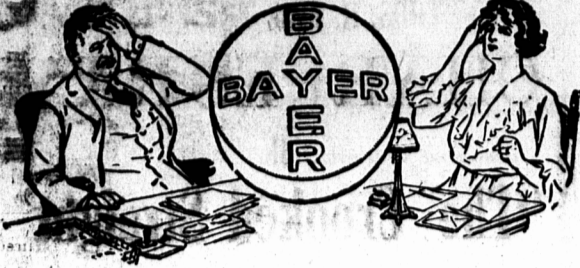

Estimates are that over 300,000 bushels of wheat stand ready for reaping. This is in addition to other grains.

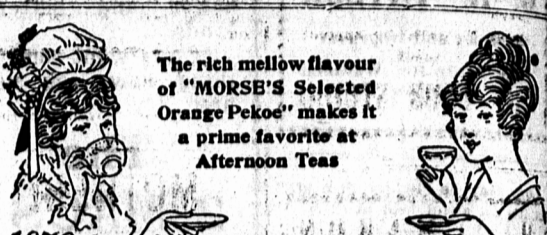
