Annual S'ide K. of C. Banquet Last Evening

The annual banquet of the Summerside Council of the Knights of Columbus was held last evening and was well attended by members of both Summerside Council and Charlottetown Council.

The guest speaker of the evening was Rev. T. P. Butler, former curate of St. Paul's parish, and now parish priest at St. Peter's Bay. He was introduced to the members by the toastmaster as an old friend of most of those present. Father Butler recalled the happy days he had spent in Summerside and expressed his great pleasure in once more being back again to renew old friendships.

Speaking of the position of the Church today in general, he referred to the condition also of the Church in France in particular. He said that today the Church is at one of her crises. Today she was in danger. The only way that some people can see God, he said, was by the image of Him that they see in other people. If they cannot see this image they have nothing to fall back on and so they are easy prey for the evils rampant today in the world.

Men are today trying to find their happiness in material things and we know that very soon they are going to find out their mistake. Father Butler said he believed, though, that the trend is gradually away from material things and if we take advantage of this change then the Church will have a resurgence. It has not had since the days of the Apostles.

The toastmaster of the evening was Major J. S. DesRoches, who carried out his duties in a manner reflecting much credit both to himself and to the local Council. Seated at the head table also were Rev. G. J. MacLellan, V. G., His Honor Lt.-Governor J. A. Bernard and Mrs. Bernard. The choice of speakers for the toasts was to the definite credit of the committee in charge and were as follows: The Church, Rev. J. A. MacLeod, B.A.; Our Country, Capt. Basil Kelly; Our Order, J. Elmer Murphy; The Ladies, Prof. J. P. MacMillan, B.A.

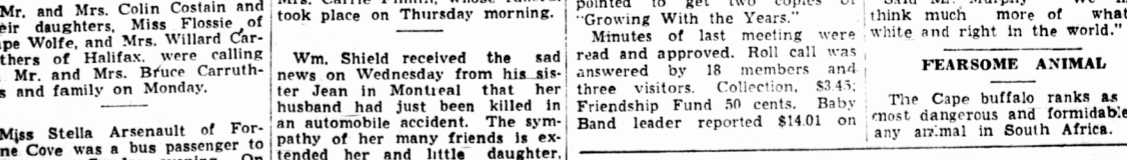
