ARTICLES AFFECTED BY TARIFF AGREEMENT

(Continued from page 1.) States, specified in schedule B and D, shall be admitted into Canada upon payment of the rates of duty specified in the said schedules when imported from the United States.

That the advantage hereby granted to the United States shall extend to any and every other foreign power which may be entitled thereto under the provisions of any treaty or convention with his majesty.

That the advantages hereby granted to the United States shall be extended to the United Kingdom and the several British colonies and possessions with respect to their commerce with Canada.

Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be held to increase any rate of duty now provided for in the British preferential tariff.

Articles free of duty—Live animals, poultry, wheat, rye, oats, barley and buckwheat, hay, straw, fresh vegetables, fresh fruits, dried fruits, dairy products, eggs, honey, seeds, fish of all kinds—fresh, frozen, packed in ice, salted or preserved in any form, except sardines and other fish preserved in oil, and shell fish of all kinds, including oysters, lobsters and clams in any state, fresh or packed and...

BLACK HAND BOMB CREATES A PANIC NEW YORK, Jan. 26—A panic was created in the Italian quarter on the upper east side today when a bomb was thrown into the basement of a building on East 83rd street. The explosion wrecked the lower part of the building and shook the neighborhood. John Carliago, a grocer, who occupied the basement, admitted to police that he had received several threatening letters from the "Black Hand."

BRITISH PARLIAMENT LONDON, Jan. 24—All the party leaders have issued letters calling their supporters to close attendance when Parliament meets on February 6. It is the Government's intention to get the veto bill disposed of before the Coronation, and this practically will compel the ministers to appropriate the whole time of the session until nearer to Government business, a condition which will like to cause considerable grumbling among the members anxious to rush other legislative matters.

LIVING IN A VAULT IN ABANDONED CEMETERY PATERSON, N. J., Jan. 25—Boys wandering through an abandoned

cemetary in the Sandy Hill section of the city today, found a woman and two girls living in a vault. All were suffering from hunger, cold and exposure, and they were sent by the police to charitable institutions. The woman said her husband was killed two years ago, since when she has been working in silk mills, but two weeks ago she lost her position and was left almost destitute.

AEROPLANE WAS ON FIRE IN THE AIR COPENHAGEN, Jan. 26—Svedens, the Danish aviator, while flying in a Voisin aeroplane, discovered while at a considerable height that his machine was on fire. The first intimation he had of the fact was when the spectators shouted at him. At the outset he paid no attention to their cries, which reached him from the ground, but at last he realized that something was wrong, and looking around saw that the flames were bursting from the framework of the aeroplane. Descending as quickly as possible, he reached the earth just in time to avoid a serious accident. The machine was destroyed.
