LIEUT. POPE RETURNING.—Mr. Geo. D. Pope of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa is in receipt of a cablegram from his son, Lieut. Arthur D. Pope who has been a prisoner of war at Graudenz, West Prussia, stating that he sailed from Danzig, Baltic Sea on November 27, and expected to arrive in Scotland on December 10. Lieut. Pope went with the Queen's University Engineers at the beginning of the war.

FROM OVERSEAS.—The following soldiers from overseas arrived on the island Monday night:—Wm. McLure, Bradabane; Henry W. McLean, Alberton; Frank Pineau, Duvar Road; Thomas A. Boyles, West Devon; Ian Darrach Kensington; Harold Campbell Irishtown; John Flynn, 126 King St. City; Chas. T. Burke, Malpeque, and Alfred Stewart of Southport. The ones who came to Charlottetown were met by Rev. Dr. Fullerton, and Mr. P. A. Hughes, Secretary of the Returned Soldiers Commission. Alfred Stewart of Southport above named left home with the 2nd Heavy Battery and was wounded. John Flynn of Charlottetown left with the 105th and was also wounded. The island boys landed in Halifax on the Hospital Ship "Araguaya" the first hospital vessel to arrive with wounded men since the armistice was signed. On board were eleven officers, nine nursing sisters, and seven hundred and sixty-three men. The Araguaya left Liverpool on November 27th. Almost immediately after leaving port she ran into bad weather and on Monday, December 2nd it blew a hurricane according to some of the boys on board. The great majority of the returning soldiers on board had seen service at the front, and many showed evidence of their wounds, some being on crutches, while others had their arms in slings, or had their faces bandaged. There were one hundred and three mental cases on board, and over fifty cot patients.

tery was in action, firing a barrage for the infantry advancing on the outskirts of Mons. The gallant Lieutenant was giving some ranges to the gunners, when the enemy shell landed between him and the gun, very severely wounding him. He was carried off to the dressing station at once but it was seen that he would not recover, as he became unconscious almost instantly. He died at the dressing station at 4 p. m., about an hour afterwards. The funeral took place next day and he was buried in the cemetery at Jemappes, British Military section, grave No. 1. Major McKinnon says: "A large number of civilians attended the funeral, and the city authorities provided a casket which was covered with wreaths brought by the inhabitants. The women cried and seemed so sorry for the Canadian boy, who died for their sake so far from home. They are a dear good people and their sympathy touched us very much. I cannot tell you how badly I feel at losing Fred, just as victory was about to be celebrated. I somehow felt so sure that we would come through O. K., as we knew, practically for sure, that peace would be signed next day, or rather the armistice. We were joking about it, and saying that we must keep our heads down. The Hun was shelling all over the place, just searching around for the Active Canadian Field Batteries, and it was a chance shot got Fred. I was, and am temporarily away from the Battery being in command

of the Brigade, so was not actually at the Battery when the sad event occurred there. I received a phone message and at once rushed over. Poor Fred was unconscious and I saw that he would not recover. I could not sleep a wink that night, and his death has worried me ever since. I was very fond of Fred and he of me. Only recently he was awarded the Military Cross for bravery at the Battle of Amiens. We are living in Mons at present, but expect to move in a few days." DAN McKINNON, Major.

LOOKING FORWARD TO BLIGHTY

This letter was received by Mrs Dobson Clarke, Muddy Creek who has two boys over seas, one in hospital wounded: France, Oct. 21st, 1918. Dear Mother,—Just a few lines to let you know I am well, hope this finds you all the same. I got the snaps you sent also a lot of letters from home, when we were in the line, but could not answer them just then and they got lost some way. We have been through some queer old places since I wrote last and there are not many of the old platoon boys left. There are a lot of new fellows. Don is in Blighty and getting along fine in hospital, the last I heard of him. He didn't last long with us. The morning he was wounded our platoon "went over"

in the first wave had to rush two gun posts and we sure had some fun before we got through. I have not been here very long myself, but have been over the top six times since August and when we did go over it was no raiding party believe me. We mostly went five or six miles before we stopped. It is getting cold and muddy here now, it is a little cold lying around at night. It is just a year the first of November since I came to this battalion and we mostly get a pass to Blighty if we hold out a year, so I am expecting one soon if the Hun don't get me before that. Well I think this is all for now, hoping to hear from you soon. I remain as ever, EARL.
