Cleveland Climbs Into Third Place With Double Victory Over Sox; Yanks Win Two

Wyatt Knocks In Winning Run As Dodgers Retain Lead In National League

BROOKLYN, Aug. 24 (AP)—The stars of the National League tangled today in a nerve-ringing doubleheader with first place at stake, and the best either could get was a draw—St. Louis Cardinals winning the first game 7-3 and Brooklyn bagging the second 3-2.

It was a storybook struggle for 31,523 fans, all the Dodger management would let into the ball park and it had a storybook ending with Jean Bald Whitlow Wyatt driving across the winning run as dusk descended on the second game, thus preserving Brooklyn's 1-2-game margin over the Red Birds with two more games remaining in the series.

The first contest was little short of a rout as the Cardinals broke out of their lethargy of recent days and humbled the Dodgers under a shower of base hits and steady pitching by Lefty Ernie White for his 16th victory of the season.

The Cardinals made a dozen hits, including seven doubles, and disposed of Kirby Hulse, thus giving the Dodgers a 1-2 game margin over the Red Birds with two more games remaining in the series.

The second affair started out where the first left off, with Hopp, Mize and Coaker Trippett bunting singles for a run in the first inning.

But then it turned into an almost airtight hurling duel between the experienced Wyatt and 19-year old Howard Pollet sensational rookie southpaw who was brought up about a week ago from Houston of the Texas League.

The youngster allowed only seven

hits and fanned six compared with a record of nine hits and eight strikeouts for Wyatt.

At Boston Bob Klinger won his eighth consecutive game for the Philadelphia Pirates, 7-3, after a 12-inning pitcher in which Braves twice came from behind to snatch a 4-3 decision.

At New York, the high flying Cincinnati Reds took both ends of a double bill with the Giants, flying Harry Cravitt hitting two homers and driving in six runs and Lonnie Frey sending five rallies across, they outslugged the Giants in the opener 13-9. Elmer Riddle hung up his 15th victory as they downed the Giants in the nightcap 6-4.

At Philadelphia, the Phillies, still in last place of the league but currently playing like wild-fire, unleashed two styles of baseball to sweep a doubleheader from Chicago Cubs 4-2 and 7-6.

Dodgers retained their select spot on top of the league Saturday in spite of a 7-1 defeat by the Cubs. The Dodgers remained a slim game and a half ahead of the Cards as the latter bowed to Philadelphia, cellar team of the league, who sprung a surprise on the Cards with a 4-2 victory.

In New York the Giants split a doubleheader with Pittsburgh Pirates, taking the opener 5-3 and then bowing out in the nightcap 4-3. Five runs in the last two innings were the dose that spelled defeat for the Braves as they were tumbled by the Reds 7-2.

Phil Pearson Triple winner At Halifax

HALIFAX, Aug. 24 (CP)—Phil Pearson of Montreal pulled the hat-trick at the Eastern Canadian Tennis Championships here yesterday, blasting his spectacular way to a triple triumph.

The leading Pearson, former Vancouverite and erstwhile Davis Cupper, had little difficulty in brushing aside Nova Scotia's first ranking player, Lieut. Don Bauld of the Royal Canadian Navy, in the men's singles. The scores were 6-4, 6-2, 6-2.

Bauld started strongly and ran up a 4-2 lead in the first set. But Pearson had weighed his opponent and, changing his tactics, began rushing the net.

With flashing volleys and a blazing overhead he rattled off point after point, taking four straight games and the set. Without giving Bauld a chance to steady his game, Pearson charged about the forecourt and easily laced through the other two sets.

Considered to have few Canadian peers as a doubles player, the Montrealer found his most bitter opposition in that division.

Teamed with Hughie Little of Halifax, he gained his second title after a grueling five-set battle with Bauld and Eric Woodworth of Halifax. They won 6-4, 5-7, 7-5, 3-6, 6-2. Both combinations were volleying sharply and the match produced the finest tennis of the journey.

Bauld particularly pulled several impossible shots which drew rounds of applause from the gallery. Bauld and Woodworth both peppered Little from all angles but the youthful stylist proved equal to the bombardment and his net play was a feature of this match.

Faired with Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax veteran of many an Eastern Championship, Pearson added the mixed doubles crown to his collection, defeating Little and Miss Jean Wright of Brooklyn, N.Y., 6-1, 3-6, 6-4.

After a listless first set, Little and Miss Wright sprang to life and turned the tables in the second. Little was everywhere with his crushing overhead smash and the pair ran up a 3-1 lead in the deciding set.

Pearson, noticeably weary, pulled himself together and with strong support from Mrs. Woodbury eked out his third championship.

Miss Wright, diminutive summer resident of Petite Riviere, N.S., upset the province's No. 1 woman player, Mrs. Harold Jones of Halifax in the women's singles' final 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

Mrs. Woodbury and Mrs. Jones annexed the women's doubles title, defeating Mrs. Jones and Mrs. S.

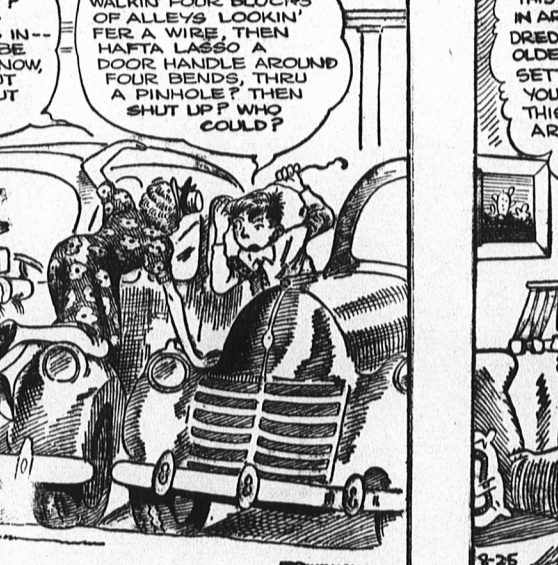

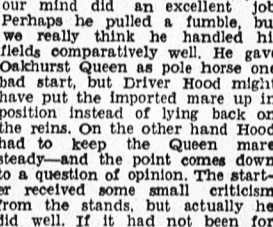

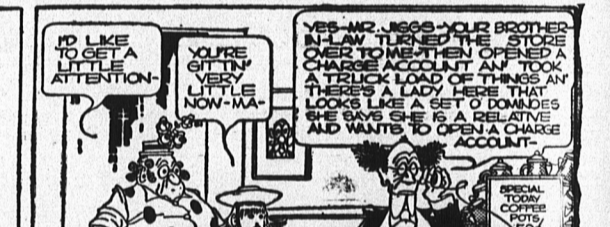
