P. C. Meeting Held Central Lot 16

There was a good attendance of electors at a meeting held by the Progressive-Conservative party in Central Lot 16 Hall on Monday evening. Mr. Robert Barrett capably acted as chairman and Mr. E.H. Strong introduced the candidate, Mr. John H. Price. Mr. Price first dealt with matters affecting the community including

the need for repairs to Grand River wharf pointing out that the last large expenditure on it was by the Borden government. He said he regretted its present poor condition and stated that the Drew government, which will shortly take power, will not leave it in its present condition. Mr. Price then dealt with the oyster industry and said that as long as American oysters are allowed to come freely into the markets of the Central provinces

as at present, our local oyster industry has a very limited outlet for its lower grade oysters. Previous to the lifting of the embargo against American oysters, every fisherman had a ready sale for such oysters but there will be little or no demand for them this coming fall. It will mean a loss of thousands of dollars to Prince County and the Province as a whole. Mr. Price suggested that at least a partial embargo should be placed on American oysters coming in to Canada during our oyster fishing season. He also dealt with the subject of freight rates and freight zoning and promised these matters would be adjusted on the return of his party to power. He then dealt very effectively with the platform of the Progressive-Conservative party and claimed that it is the only party with a definite platform in this election. He showed how false are the statements of opposing speakers who state that if the Progressive-Conservatives are elected the Summerside airport would be closed. Mayor J. Frank Arnett of Summerside ably reviewed the issues before the electors and showed how misleading are the statements of the Liberal candidate to the effect that he was responsible for the planing of the car ferry and the reduction of truck rates on the ferry. Mrs. Price spoke briefly directing her remarks to the many women present. — S

Total damage is estimated to be in the vicinity of \$3,000.00 with a small amount of insurance.

Mr. Breakenridge came to Summerside direct from Kempton, Indiana, where he has held a pastorate since 1946. The new pastor was extended a civic welcome by His Worship Mayor J.F. Arnett, who recalled that he had had the pleasure two years ago of welcoming Mr. Bilson and he felt sure that the same warm friendship and cooperation would be extended to Mr. Breakenridge as had been enjoyed by his predecessor.
